The Tone of the Market Is Steady in
Nearly All Lines.

Detroit, April 25.—There is a firm
tone in the egg market. Receipts are
fair, but stocks are light and dealers
believe in higher prices. Creamers
butter is abundant and slow, but
there are only small receipts of good
dairy product and the market in that
direction is firm. Receipts of poultry
show little increase and the demand
is sufficient to care for more than is
coming in. Tomatoes and strawber-
ries are coming in more freely and rule
easier. Linseed oil is lower. The
sugar market is firm and an advance
would not be a surprise to the trade.
Coffee is easy and quiet.
