Bad Axe is to have a chicory plant. The Democrat in speaking of the project, says. "The new plant will be located on the west side of the P. M. railway and just north of the round-house. Four large buildings will be erected at a cost of about \$10,000, all of the buildings excepting the receiving shed will be substantial brick structures. The work of construction will be commenced as soon as the material can be procured. Mr. Muller expressed himself as being very much pleased with the outlook here and stated that if the farmers would take hold of the matter with a will and raise enough chicory to make it profitable he would put in a factory here that would be second to none in the world. A representative of the company will be here next week and will be prepared to give out seed to the farmers who have agreed to grow chicory."

A rather peculiar case developed in one of the Justice courts the other day, which goes to show how closely collections are watched, by some attorneys. It seems that a farmer in an adjoining township purchased some agricultural implements four or five years ago for which he gave his note. When the note fell due he refused to pay and in course of time suit was instituted in the circuit court and judgement obtained for the face of the note with costs and interest. Time rolled on but no property could be found on which to levy to satisfy the judgement. Meanwhile the attorney for the holders of the note had been elected to the office of Justice of Peace in the township where he lived, and a few days ago the farmer appeared before him to qualify on a bail bond. The farmer swore that he owned 80 acres of land in the county, describing it and now the attorney-justice proposes to levy on that land. If it turns out that the farmer does not own it he is in line for a perjury prosecution. In either event the case looks like one that will have to be settled.—Huron Co. Republican.

## Ordinance Number Twenty-Six.

An Ordinance relative to the construction and maintenance of sidewalks in the public streets in the Village of Cass City and the duties of the Street Commissioner in relation thereto. The Village of Cass City Ordains

Sec. 1. That all sidewalks hereafter constructed in the public streets of the Village of Cass City, shall be constructed by the Village Council and shall be under their supervision and control, and shall be of such width and on such grades as the council shall by resolution prescribe and shall be built of cement or Portland cement, or such other material as the council may by resolution prescribe: Provided that no plank or wooden sidewalks shall hereafter be constructed on any public street or streets within said Village.

Sec. 2. That one-half of the expense of constructing all sidewalks under the provisions of this ordinance shall be paid from the General Street Fund, and the remaining one-half shall be a charge upon the lots and premises adjacent to and abutting upon such walks.

Sec. 3. The owners and occupants of lots and premises adjacent to and abutting upon any of the sidewalks, heretofore or hereafter constructed within said Village shall keep the same free from ice, snow, filth and nuisances.

Sec. 4. The expenses of rebuilding, repairing and maintaining all sidewalks constructed under the provisions of this ordinance shall be paid from the General Street Fund.

Sec. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore passed by the Village of Cass City relative to the construction and maintenance of sidewalks are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect and become operative on and after the 27th day of April A. D. 1901. Passed and adopted April 23rd, A. D. 1901.
