#### COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

(Continued from first page.)  
walk on the South side of Houghton Street, in front of and adjacent to Lot 4 Block 2 of Deming's Addition, to be of the width of 4 feet and be at least 6 inches higher than the grade of said street, a sidewalk on the South side of Houghton Street, in front of and adjacent to Lots 1, 2 and 3 of Block 13 of Seegar's Addition, to be 4 feet wide and at least 6 inches higher than the grade of said street, a sidewalk on the South side of Houghton Street, in front of and adjacent to Lots 1, 3 and 4 of Block 15 of Seegar's Addition, to be 4 feet wide and be at least 6 inches higher than the grade of said street, a sidewalk on the South side of Houghton Street, in front of and adjacent to Lots 1 and 2 of Block 1 of Seegar's Addition, to be 4 feet wide and be not less than 6 inches above the grade of said street, a sidewalk on the West side of West Street, abutting upon and adjacent to Lots 1, 10 and 11 of Willey and McNeal's Addition, to be 4 feet wide and be not less than 6 inches higher than the grade of said street, a sidewalk on the West side of West Street, in front of and adjacent to Lot 13 of Block "A," of Kelland's Addition, to be 4 feet wide and at least 6 inches higher than the grade of said street, a sidewalk on the West side of West Street, in front of and adjacent to a piece of land commencing at the North-east corner of Lot 13 of Block "A," of Kelland's Addition running West 134 rods, North 12 rods, East 13 rods, and South 12 rods to the place of beginning, to be 4 feet wide and 6 inches higher than the grade of said street.  
Be it further resolved that said sidewalks be completed on or before the first day of October.  
Dated May 7th, 1901.  
Resolutions relative to building sidewalks was also adopted.  
W. C. Janks requested that ordinance No. 2 relative to hucksters and peddlers be enforced. The same was read by the clerk for information. At this juncture the mysterious absence of Street Commissioner Ramsey was noticed by the council. As his presence was absolutely necessary, the president appointed a committee of one to look up the strayed away official. He was found, not far away either, and with a blooming countenance soon made his appearance in the council chamber.  
Upon motion, the street commissioner was instructed to purchase material for building cement walks at the best figures obtainable.  
The business having been transacted, the council adjourned.


