### The Benefits of Co-operation.

Farmers are learning gradually the advantages of voluntary co-operation. In Wabash county, Indiana, where the farmers believe in road improvement they have united to build roads independent of the county commissioners. Under the plan adopted an agreement has been entered into under which each owner of abutting property is assessed \$1.50 an acre in work or cash to be paid within three years. The land thus assessed extends back for a half mile on either side of the road. The work is done in dull seasons when the farmers can best spare the time. At the end of the three years when this work is completed the county commissioners are notified and an inspection of the road is made by the county surveyor. If it satisfactorily meets all the requirements it is turned over to the county commissioners who undertake to keep it in good condition. Chester and Pleasant townships are said to be blessed with a large turnpike mileage, which has been built in this way at an expense to the farmers considerably less than the same roads would have cost if built by the commissioners with hired labor.

Another illustration of the benefits of co-operation in a very different line, is afforded by the report of the Western South Dakota Stockmen's Association, an organization for the mutual benefit and protection of members. The association employs a large number of inspectors at the various market points, who are familiar with the brands of all the cattle shipped from the west. It is the duty of these men to examine the brands borne by all animals shipped to market. They are the terror of the cattle thieves, and few stolen animals can be marketed without detection. The inspectors made a remarkable record during the past year in detecting "stray" cattle, which may have been animals that had been stolen or those which had strayed far from their range during the storms of winter and drifted with the herds of cattlemen. Cattle bearing unfamiliar brands or the brands of cattlemen on remote portions of the range are gathered together during the round-ups and shipped with other cattle to market. The inspectors can usually identify them, and the proceeds of their sale are then forwarded to the owner if his name and postoffice can be ascertained, and if not to the secretary or treasurer of the association who lives nearest the supposed range of the animals taken up as strays. If the owner cannot be located the money goes into the treasury of the association.

During the year there were 170,000 range cattle inspected at Chicago, of which 36,000 were South Dakota animals, and 3,440 strays were recovered. The value of the strays was \$125,169.93. A total of 330,000 range cattle were inspected at South Omaha, of which 35,000 were from the ranges of South Dakota. The strays recovered aggregated 2,126 in number, valued at \$72,640.85. Range cattle inspected at Sioux City during the year aggregated 20,000, of which 14,000 were from South Dakota. The strays recovered numbered 767 and were valued at \$31,713.79. Thus during the year the stock inspectors recovered stray animals whose aggregate value was over \$250,000.

Sweet potatoes rarely blossom and never mature seed in northern latitudes, but in tropical and sub-tropical countries they perform this function as do their relatives, the morning glories, in temperate regions. They are propagated mostly from tubers or from sprouts of tubers, the latter being the more common way.

The preparation of soil for sweet potatoes is not difficult. As with corn, a clover soil is very good, but if a crop has intervened between the clover and the sweet potatoes it will be still better, as in that way cut-worms may be avoided. The plants are set on ridges from two to twelve inches high, and these ridges are generally three or three and one-half feet apart. The plants should be about eighteen inches apart in the row. The ground must be kept free from weeds and grass till the potato vines have developed sufficiently to take possession. If the weeds have been neglected and appear above the potato vines after the latter have covered the ground too much to permit of cultivation, they should be pulled up after the ground has been moistened by a rain. The "rooting" of the vine does no harm, in spite of opinion to the contrary.

Wolf hunting is fast becoming a necessity as well as a pastime to the farmers living a few miles north of Creighton, Neb. Not only the common coyote, but also the larger species known as the gray wolf, is the cause of their trouble, several farmers having lost hogs and young calves. The manhunters are very bold, coming within a few feet of the dog, even in daylight, and then seizing a fowl, soon disappear over a neighboring hilltop.

### IN BUYING FISH.

Simple Rules for the Guidance of the Purchaser.

Nothing is more difficult in marketing than to tell whether a fish has been properly killed. It should be killed as soon as taken from the water, but too frequently it is allowed to gasp itself to death and then treated so as to appear properly slaughtered. The only absolutely safe way is to buy a live fish and have it killed before one's eyes. This is not always practicable, but there are certain rules which, if observed, will result in the purchaser getting fish of good quality. Fish purchased killed must not smell any different from ordinary fish odors; they must have their natural color, and should never be covered with slime. When the meat is silmy and fatty it proves that the fish is not fresh. Fish, the meat of which looks bleached, with white spots on the skin, sunken eyes and discolored mouth and gills, should not be bought under any consideration. Fresh water fish must be of brilliant color, the scales must adhere closely to the body, the eyes must be clear, the gills clear and rosy. Slimy fish, with the scales loose and projecting from the body, are spotted and very unwholesome.
