It looks as though there might be hope for the South after all. At the opening of a circuit court at Jackson, Miss., the other day, Judge Powell instructed the grand jury to investigate the recent lynching of a negro at Terry and to return indictments against the guilty persons. At the conclusion of the judge's charge he emphasized the fact that he was thoroughly in earnest by handing to the foreman a list of citizens who are said either to have been connected with the lynching or to know of those who were. The lynching referred to took place about four months ago, the negro having entered the room of a young woman at night. The judge's charge was a severe arraignment of lynching and an appeal to the people of Mississippi to assist in breaking it up. He pointed out that it was not only a great crime, but frequently a great blunder, as has been shown in Mississippi lately when the haste of the mob in lynching prisoners had prevented the real criminals from being captured. The strong appeal of Judge Powell is taken as evidence that the judiciary of the state, co-operating with Gov. Longino, has not abandoned the attempt to suppress lynching in Mississippi in spite of two failures.

The attitude of some of the newspapers in the state is sickening. While Gov. Pingree was alive they damned him into the farthest corner of the bottomless pit, and now since he is dead, these same papers are lauding him into the third heaven. O! Consistency thou art a jewel!

After a month's vacation the Machinists and allied crafts of Saginaw and Bay City settled down to work again, much refreshed by their holiday and satisfied with the compromise agreement entered into with the Metal Trades Association of the Valley. The strike for a nine hour day and 12-1-2 per cent increase in wages began May 20th. Last Monday morning all the shops were opened and are now running full blast with all the old hands at work.

Pension Commissioner Evans is still in office in spite of the cheap pension attorneys, and the other fellow.

Pingree was a conundrum. He was good and bad. He possessed elements of strength and weakness. His good deeds were often neutralized by his profanity. As an example to young men he was a failure. The bacchanalian feast which marked the close of his administration as governor of Michigan was a disgrace to the people of the state. In brief, he lacked the moral stamina of a true statesman.

Populists and Silver Republicans have had a great meeting in Kansas City and taken definite steps toward the organization of a new third party which is intended to be national. It is said the leaders first consulted Mr. Bryan and that the movement has his approval.
