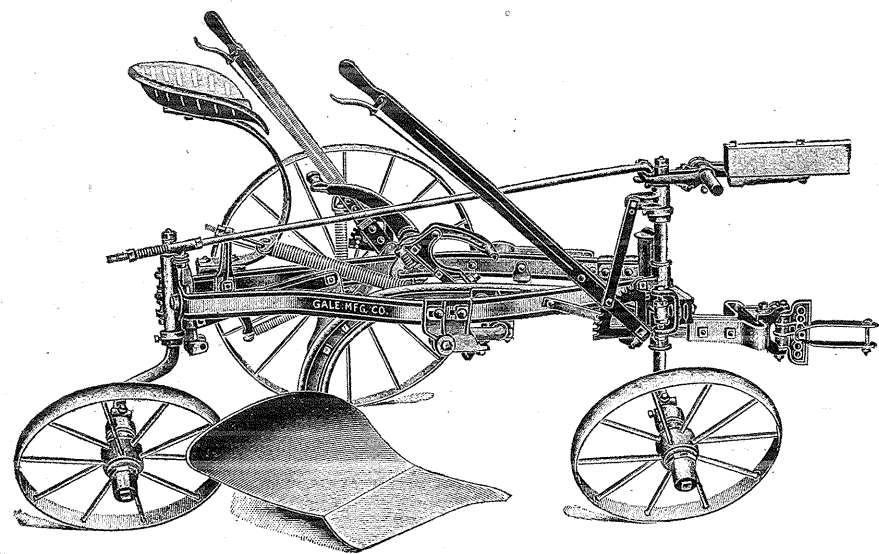

Gale Foot Lift Sulky Plow

In order to make a satisfactory plow, it is necessary to use good material and employ efficient and experienced workmen. The plow must be correctly designed, properly erected, of good material and plenty of it. It is impossible to make a strong, durable plow with cheap or weak material. A few pounds of steel properly placed will add years to the life of a plow.

A perfect plow must be durable, it must do good work, and must be easy to operate. These are all embodied in the Gale.

GALE--Means Good

The Gale Foot Lift Sulky is a single bail plow. To this bail the beam is attached with a heavy saddle casting, with a wide bearing which prevents the plow from rocking out of the proper position. The bail is very heavy, made of high carbon steel and will not bend or break. To this bail is also attached the foot lift and the land wheel. The movement that lifts the plow out of the ground, automatically levels the frame, and when the plow is put into the ground the land wheel is again automatically leveled to compensate for the lower level of the two furrow wheels. The land lever is attached to the axle with a yielding spring connection, which permits the wheel to pass over uneven surfaces of the ground without affecting the depth of plowing.

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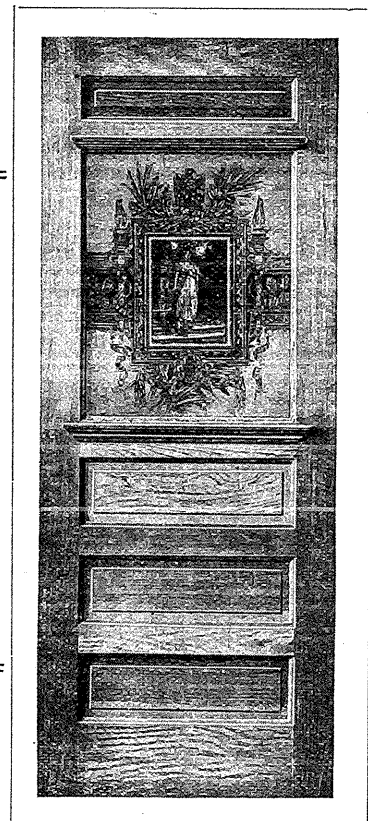
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
