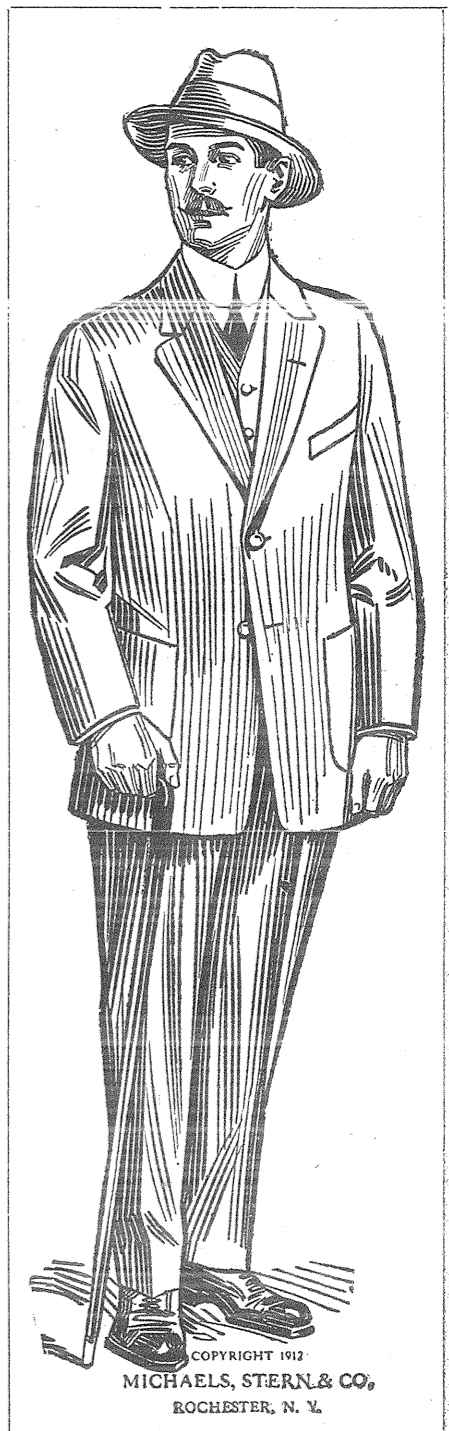

ELLINGTON PIONEER

Samuel Elliott Who Died May 14 Selected Own Pall Bearers.

Samuel Elliott passed away at his home in Ellington Tuesday, May 14. Mr. Elliott was born in Mallorytown, Ont., June 12, 1834. In October, 1863, he was united in marriage to Miss Mercy Wickware of Mallorytown. To them three children were born, two of whom survive: Sherman, of Ellington, and Frank of Kalamazoo.

Mr. and Mrs. Elliott came to Michigan in 1868, settling first in Caro, then in Cass City, and in 1874 came to their home in Ellington. Besides a widow and the two children, he leaves two sisters, Mrs. Richardson and Mrs. Monroe, of Landstown, Ont.
