Members of the Tuscola County Medical society met at Caro Monday and adopted a revised fee bill. The new rates call for an advance on several lines of practice. The members of the society claim that the physicians' fees which have prevailed in past years were made 20 to 30 years ago and that living expenses are 50 per cent higher at the present age and drugs and medicines run from 20 to 50 per cent more in

The new fees adopted call for an increased price for night work over services performed in the day. Seventy-five per cent of night calls, the doctors say, might just as well be attended to during the day. Physicians, like other men, need their rest and if they must work at night, then they will demand extra compensations.
