Complete Information on Prices for Admission.

While many of the county fairs in Michigan have advanced the prices of admission, the officials of the Cass City Fair have decided to maintain the low rates of former years. A membership ticket which will entitle its owner to membership in the Association, and also allow himself, his wife and minor children to enter exhibits in all classes, except where entry fees are charged, will be sold for \$1.00. This ticket will entitle its owner, whose name will be written thereon, to admission to grounds during fair. There will be attached to said membership ticket three coupon tickets, good during fair, one to admit wife, and two to admit unmarried children under 21 years of age, who reside at home. Extra coupon tickets, to be used in connection with membership tickets, can be purchased for 25 cents each, good during fair.

Single Admission Tickets—Children under ten years free, when accompanied by parents. All persons over 10 years old, 25 cents each. Team or single horse, 25 cents. Single admission tickets given up at the gate.

A team ticket, good to admit a team or a single horse during the fair, name of owner written thereon and not transferable, will be sold for 50 cents.

One more week 'till Cass City fair, the time for shaking hands with your friends.

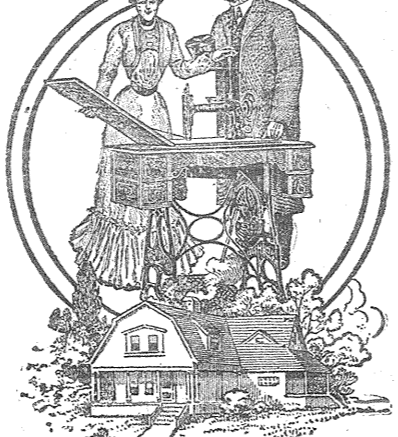
