During the siege of Knoxville he used 163 mule wagons, six mules to the wagon, hauling supplies from Camp Nelson over the mountains to Knoxville. On one of these trips he was attacked by rebels and only after desperate fighting were he and his guards able to make their escape.

After his return from the war he was elected sheriff of Tuscola county for two terms. This was during the time that the Cass river pine was being lumbered and he had the toughest lumber-jacks to deal with. He often had to resort to a fist fight before he could handcuff a prisoner. Later he was marshal for 15 years.



ceivable that an argument might be framed to prove that the men have not always and invariably justified their use of it. Men do not vote because they always vote right, or because politics is their authentic and peculiar sphere; they vote simply and solely because they are men; there is no other reason under the constitution or under the sky. And the only reason why women should vote or why they should have the right to vote is because they are women, because in common with men they are a part, and it would seem quite an essential part of humanity.

I do not wish to be understood as saying that there are not large and exceptional effects to be expected from the enfranchisement of women. 1 think, indeed, that their entrance into politics will be greatly beneficial, and, first of all, to woman herself, for it will enlarge all the interests of her life for herself and for others, since she will have the opportunity to know more than, for instance, one of the girls in Jane Austen's charming novels. And then it will have the effect of increasing the appreciation of spiritual values and help to determine policies on a plane somewhat above the sordid and material. It will disseminate, I think, a new and intuitive social sense that must realize and conserve social values. It will do all these things, but if it were to accomplish nothing else, if it were merely to satisfy the conscience and the simple de mands of justice, it would be of im mense advantage, because it will bring to the consideration of our communal affairs an intellectual force at once dynamic and novel. It will indicate an original point of view, for women will survey the political field with what the painters call a fresh eye, bring to bear upon political subjects a fresh mind, and the effect of all this will be to stir and shock some of our shellbacked old partisans into a re-examination of the grounds of their belief, or as is more likely to be the case, the causes of their prejudices, and that of itself would be a sufficient justification.

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES IN NEW YORK

OB ELMER HEDGES, the nominee of the Republicans for gov ernor of New York, was born in Elizabeth, N. J., on May 10. 1862, the son of Job Clark and Eliza beth Wood Hedges. He was graduated from Princeton with the class of 1884 and three years later gained the degree of master of arts for post graduate study. He completed his education at Columbia University Law school, from which he was graduated in 1886, and immediately began the

His entrance into Republican poli tics occurred in 1895, when he was chosen by the late Mayor William L. Strong as private secretary. He then began to figure extensively in the newspapers because of a gift of native humor and repartee. In May, 1897 he was appointed a city magistrate and acted in this capacity until the following December, when he resigned.

His first political office of importance came in his appointment at the request of Colonel Roosevelt, then governor of New York, to the office of deputy attorney general. Mr. Roosevelt later took out of the hands of District Attorney Asa Bird Gardiner of New York county the prosecution of numerous election frauds and intrusted the task to Mr. Hedges.

President Roosevelt on Nov. 7, 1908, chose him for the important post of assistant treasurer of the United States at New York as the successor to Hamilton Fish, who had resigned to become a candidate for congress This appointment Mr. Hedges, although strongly urged to accept, was trouble ahead if not removed, so obliged to decline because of private business interests.

Mr. Hedges was one of the founders and former president of the Society of the Genesee and is now a member

of its board of governors. He is also a member of the New York State Bar association, the Bar Association of the City of New York, the Sons of Veterans, the Sons of the American Revolution and of the Union League, University, Princeton, Lawyers' and Republican clubs of New York city.

James Wolcott Wadsworth, Jr., the Republican nominee for lieutenant governor, was born in Geneseo, N. Y., on Aug. 12, 1877, the son of ex-Congressman James W. Wadsworth and Louisa Travers Wadsworth. He received his education at St. Mark's school. Southboro, Mass., and at Yale university, where he was graduated with the degree of B. A. in 1898. He married on Sept. 30, 1902, Miss Alice Hay of Newbury, N. H. He has a large farm at Geneseo, N. Y. He is also a director in the Genesee Valley National bank and other important corporations.

Immediately after his graduation from college he enlisted as a private in Battery A. Pennsylvania field artillery, and served throughout the campaign in Porto Rico. His debut in politics occurred in 1900, when he organized a political marching club called the McKinley and Roosevelt rough riders, with which he toured the state to create enthusiasm for the Republican national ticket. He was elected to the assembly from Livingston county in 1904 and served successively to the close of the session of 1910, when he retired to accept membership in the Republican state committee. From 1905 until 1910 he acted as speaker of the

assembly. Mr. Wadsworth broke openly with Theodore Roosevelt while the latter was still in the White House in April 1907. Mr. Roosevelt had been the chief influence in ending the political career of the elder Wadsworth, having attacked him in connection with the beef trust scandal.

GENERAL RE-REGISTRATION NOT REQUIRED IN TWPS.

Continued from first page. and townships the second Saturday preceding the general election. This

act does not, however, mean that ing (the physiology class) questions there must be a general re-registration; it means merely that the been giving a few tests for which boards of registration shall convene for the purpose of completing the lists of the qualified voters. Electors who are already registered in the precinct in which they will vote in November are not obliged to reregister.

"Act No. 97 of the Public Acts of 1911, does not, however, apply to cities of the 4th class. Such cities are governed by the fourth class city act, Chapter 83, section 2956 et seq. of the Compiled Laws of 1897. This act provides in section 2987 that there shall be a re-registration in the year 1900 and every fourth year thereafter, so there should be a reregistration in cities of the fourth class this year.

"As rural districts are governed by Act 97 of the Public Acts of 1911 there should not be a re-registration in rural districts this year."
