The company will be ready to receive grain without cleaning the first of next week, and expect to be prepared to clean grain in about 30 days.

Members of the company are well pleased with the prompt action of the fire company and citizens in responding to the alarm and in assisting to prevent the entire destruction of the property.

Also Recommends Specific Tax on Autos in Lieu of State License and Local Tax.

The commissioner says that many system by the state and county are perance sentiment. allowed to deteriorate by the latter officials who have charge of their upkeep. He advocates that the state pay a small amount per mile for the upkeep of the roads and take charge of the work. State inspectors often find state reward roads that are neglected, but can do nothing.

The commissioner also recommends that the state increase the roads in width. At present the state allows the counties \$500 per mile for grav el roads nine feet wide, and \$1,000 per mile for macadam of the same width. He advocates that the department be allowed to build the roads as 16 feet wide and allow the counties \$100 for each additional foot over the nine. The commissioner says the nine-foot road is too narrow on the main thoroughfares where there is passing of rigs.
