You are hereby notified that an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of this State, by adding a new section thereto providing for prohibition in the State forever of the manufacture, sale, keeping for sale, giving away, bartering or furnishing of any vinous, malt, brewed, fermented, spirituous or intoxicating liquors, except for medicinal, mechanical, chemical, scientific or sacramental purposes; an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of this State, by adding a new section thereto providing that every incorporated city and village, and organized township shall each have the right to determine whether or not there shall be prohibited therein the manufacture and sale of malt, brewed, fermented, vinous, distilled or intoxicating liquors; an amendment to Section 30 of Article V of the Constitution of this State, relative to right of repeal of local or special acts by the legislature; an amendment to Article XII of the Constitution of this State, by adding a new section thereto providing for the incorporation, regulation and supervision of fraternal benefit societies, shall be submitted to the qualified electors of your county on Tuesday, November seventh, nineteen hundred sixteen.
