Did Farmer Consider Everything? While talking to a farmer the following was gleaned: "Farmers, as a rule. do not like to send their money to Chicago or any other place for their goods. They would rather buy of their local away from your home town. You buy merchants if their prices are not out from a picture and wait a week or of reason.
