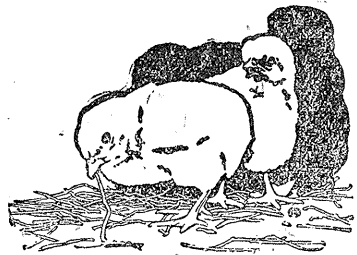

We are billed for the Lotus Flower show on the 9th.

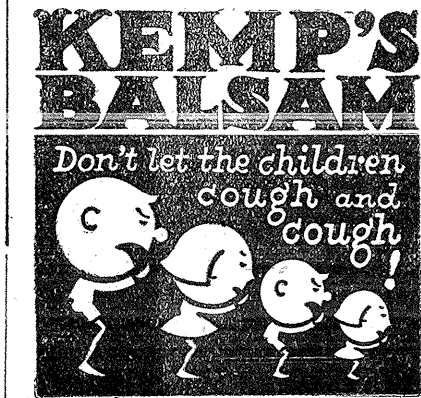

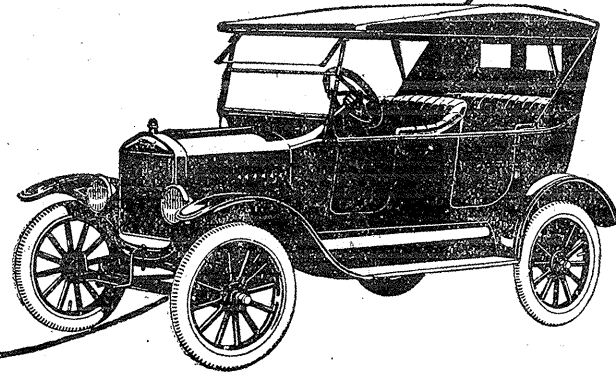

WHY NOT?

Several years ago the state tax commission covered the state with a small army of assessing officers and raised the valuation to a point said to be the cash value of all real estate. If it was possible and lawful at that time to do this why not now send out the same officers and lower the as-

essment on all real estate to its present cash value? Why do this? Because the efforts so far made to help the farmers have been more or less abortive and it is a well known fact that, few if any farms in Michigan would sell at their present assessed value. It is also well known that in former years the taxes on farm property were only an incidental expense, whereas at present they have become a serious burden.

It is very different in the large cities and manufacturing centers where real estate rents are at the high point. Without a careful survey of the situation it looks as though an assessment on real estate as applied to farms, at present cash value would reduce the taxes on the farm 30 or 40 per cent.—Jonesville Independent.
