### SEVEN MOONSHINERS PLEADED GUILTY

MAN ON TRIAL FOUR DAYS AFTER.

Errors in Search Warrants Made it here. Possible Dismissal of Six Cases.

Five persons charged with violations of the prohibition law came to trial in circuit court in Tuscola county Tuesday and entered pleas of guilty. Judge Williams imposed fines and costs ranging from \$50 to \$150.

Wm. LaPratt pleaded guilty to prohibition law violation and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and costs of \$50, or spend 60 days in the county jail.

Ray Beardsley stood mute when arraigned on a similar charge and a plea of not guilty was entered. He furnished bonds of \$500 for his appearance later in court.

Carl Fischer pleaded guilty to a violation of the prohibition law and was fined \$100 and \$50 costs. In default of payment, a jail sentence not exceeding 60 days will be given.





### Michigan Happenings

"Each year the forest fires in the United States destroy or damage nough lumber to build five-room houses for the entire city of San Prancisco or Washington" according to Prof. Chittenden of Lansing. The end of forest fires in Michigan will come only by the exercise of the greatest care by all persons traveling in the timber zones, and actual work of reforestation can begin only when fires are ended. Camp fires, cigars, cigarets and carelessly dropped matches are the principal sources of forest ruin.

Highway construction records for Michigan are bèing smashed by G. P. Scharl, Muskegon, in his construction of the Grand Rapids-Lansing concrete road. Scharl's objective is to grade, cut and fill the new right-ofway, prepare portions of the old roads and to lay a 29-foot pavement 47 miles long within 12 months. Operations are being carried on 24 hours of the day. For 14 miles, the stretch upon which work is now concentrated, high-candled electric lights illuminate the place at night.

The U.S. government is losing approximately \$2,000,000 per year at the Sault Ste. Marie shop canal alone,, as a result of the lowered water level resultant from the Chicago drainage canal Superintendent L. C. Sabin of the Saint Mary's Falls canal has stated. Under a permit from the government the Chicago canal is allowed the use of 4.167 cubic feet of water per second, but it is using nearer to 9,000 cubic feet, Mr. Sabin said. This has lowered the level of water from 4 inches to 4 1-2 inches.

A year old baby, Richard Stazik, was killed and its parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Stazik, of Lansing, injured seriously near Leslie, when the auto nobile in which they were riding swerved from the road, hit and broke a telephone pole and landed wheels up in a ditch. The driver, Peter Mens, of Lansing, turned to speak to Mr. Stazik in the rear seat and lost control of the car, it was said. Mr. Menez escaped injury.

There will be an auditorium with a seating capacity of \$00, a large gymnasium, swimming pool, showers, cafeteria, special music and art rooms, and a large library and study hall. The new school will accommodate 500 pupils.

Battle Creek city employes must be on the job every day in the future if they hope to draw their full salaries, according to a resolution passed by the city commission. No time will be allowed off without reduction of pay unless the employe shall furnish a medical certificate to prove that loss of time is due to sickness. The resolution provided for a day off each week and 15 day annual vacation. The action was aimed at members of the police and fire departments, who are said to have taken "promiscuous vacations.

George Tourcotte, 4 years old, died and his brother was fatally burned when the family home in Sault Ste. Marie was destroyed by fire. A fireman carried the two boys from the fire in their bedicem shortly before the house collapsed. George, however, was dead, and Roy burned badly. 


