Misses Elynore Bigelow, Helen Turner and Mary Newberry, students at Mt. Pleasant normal, visited at their respective homes over the week-end.

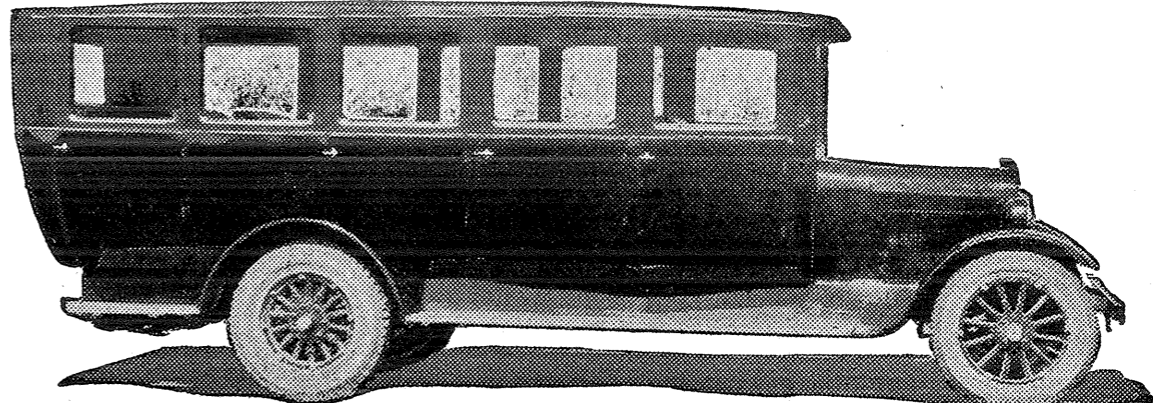

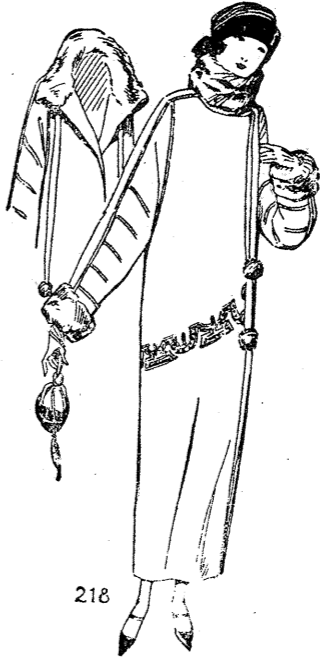
