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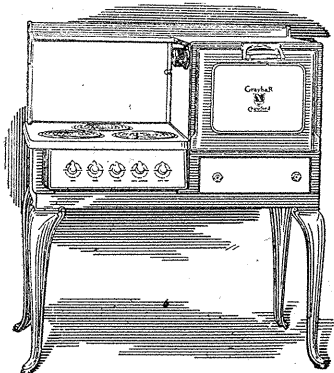

#### DEATHS OF THE WEEK.

T. P. Zander. Tacitus P. Zander, a practicing attorney for Tuscola and Saginaw counties for the past 47 years, died Saturday at his home, 911 West Genee avenue, Saginaw, at the age of 76.

Mr. Zander was born October 3, 1853, in Ottawa, Ill., and spent his boyhood in Wisconsin. There he went to school and later attended the Cook County Normal school at Chicago. He taught school in Cook county for seven years and then moved to Caro, Mich., where he studied law in the office of Black & Quinn. He became a member of the bar in Caro in 1883 and nine years later took up the practice of his profession in Saginaw.

Mr. Zander's health failed about six years ago, necessitating his retirement from practice. As a Republican Mr. Zander was elected circuit court commissioner in 1896. He was a member of the Saginaw County Bar Association.

Mr. Zander was married August 24, 1879, to Miss Addie Brooker, who died the same date 11 years later. On June 22, 1896, he married Miss Lois M. Brooker of Cass City. He is survived by his widow, two sons, J. Morley and Archie E. Zander, and two daughters, Mrs. Lola M. Shaw of Saginaw and Mrs. John E. Yunker of Los Angeles, Calif.

Funeral services were held Monday morning at the home, Rev. John C. Schroeder officiated, with burial in Ellington cemetery.
