STUFFED TOMATOES ARE MOST APPETIZING

Most Appetizing Vegetable for Serving Stuffed.


(Prepared by the United States Department | 2 tbs. chopped pars- 1 tbs. onion pulp

One of the most successful and appetizing vegetables for serving stuffed is the tomato. Large, unblemished tomatoes should be chosen, firm enough to hold their shape when cooked. After they have been washed remove a thin slice from the stem. Carefully scoop out the pulp so that the tomato shell will not be broken. This pulp is added to the stuffing. Here is the entire recipe, tested by the bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture: Stuffed Tomatoes. 6 large firm toma- 14 tsp. celery seed

tsp. salt toes 1 cup diced salt pork 1/3 tsp. pepper cup dry bread crumbs 14 cup buttered erumbs

of Agriculture.)

Fry the salt pork until crisp and remove it from the pan. Add the parsley and onion to the fat and cook for two or three minutes, then add the cup of dry bread crumbs, the salt, celery seed, and cooked salt pork, and stir until well mixed. After preparing the tomatoes for stuffing, mix the pulp with the seasoned bread crumbs and salt pork and add more salt if necessary. Fill the tomato cups with the mixture and cover the top with the buttered crumbs. Put the stuffed tomatoes in a pan in a moderate oven and cook until the tomatoes are tender and the crumbs are brown. Serve from the dish in which cooked.
