ballot next Tuesday and why he should vote "No" on the proposed amendment to the state constitution relative to number and apportionment of representatives and senators in the state legislature. In a letter sent to the press of Tuscola county, Mr. Robertson says:

"Detroit and Wayne county politicians have injected a re-apportionment amendment to our State Constitution into our November election and we are asked to vote (Yes) or (No).

"The matter was brought about by the initiative petition plan which provides that an amendment to our constitution must be submitted to the voters of our State upon the filing of the petition signed by not less than 10 per cent of the qualified electors, and

setting forth the full text of the proposed amendment.

"The amendment as proposed provides that a re-apportionment of the representative and senatorial districts of the State shall be made by the Secretary of State if it is not done by the Legislature, upon a showing of sufficient increase of population of any county to entitle them to increased representation.

"The Constitution provides that there shall not be more than a total of 100 representatives in the House and 32 senators in the Senate. Of this number Wayne county already has 21 House members and 7 Senators, or more than onefifth of the entire Legislature.

"Population increase in Detroit and suburbs would doubtless entitle Wavne county to a much larger representation than they now have and they have great difficulty in securing re-apportionment by the Legislature as now provided because the Legislature refused to place Wayne county in position to dominate the legislative affairs in Michigan.

"Aside from the above, there is some danger in trusting the judgment and discretion of one man,

the Secretary of State, to re-ap-portion all of the legislative districts of Michigan no matter how wise and discreet that man may be. "Out-state legislators feel that it is unsafe to allow any county to approach a majority of the representation and some measure should be adopted to limit the percentage of representation of any county to a safe point.

"Legislators outside of Wayne feel very keenly that there is great danger in the amendment presented for consideration at this time, and hope it may be defeated.

"Detroit and Wayne county politicians are well organized and are making a determined effort to write this dangerous amendment into our Constitution and with the greatly increased population in Wayne county, they might easily succeed.

"It is most important to outstate interests that this measure be defeated and you are urged to let nothing keep you from voting No on the amendment which is the fourth from the top on the ballot.
