First Buyer— First among the buyers of tuberculosis Christmas seals in Gagetown was Miss Edith E. Miller, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association has announced. Early indications show that last year's per capita purchase of seals in this county, which was 1.28 will be surpassed in the 1933 sale. The per capita purchase in the state in 1932 was 2.32 seals. Revenue from the sale goes directly into the work of health education and for tuberculin tests and x-ray examinations given to thousands of Michigan school children annually.
