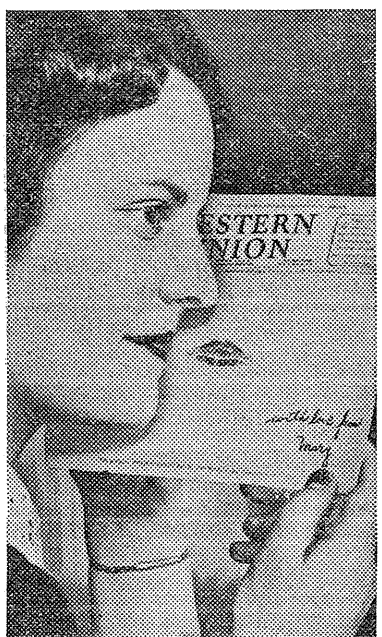

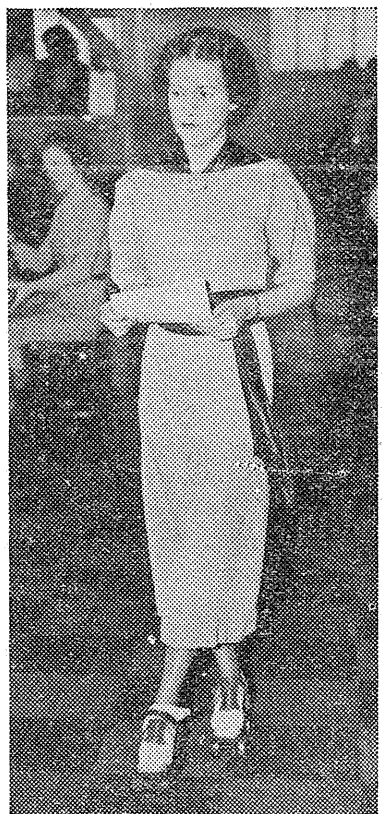
A Pair of Old Socks.

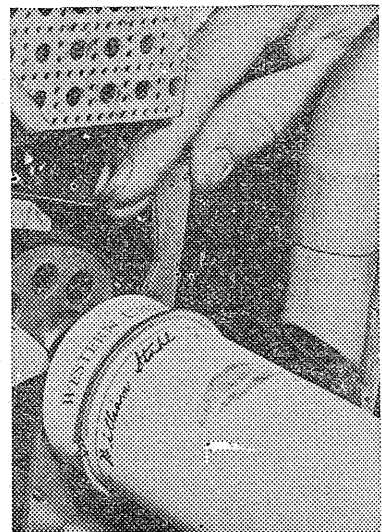
VALENTINE GREETINGS

During his residence here, Mr. Buehrly had been a member of the Evangelical Church, serving that society as a member of the board of trustees for 25 years, as Sunday School superintendent for three years, and as class leader and steward. Mr. Buehrly was a member of the building committee in charge of the erection of the first Evangelical Church edifice here in 1884.

In this age of endeavoring to shift burdens on other shoulders, it is rather unusual to find one anxious to assume more than his allotted share of the day's burdens.
