

## H. S. Class of 1921 Celebrated 25th Anniversary

Banquet and Program Enjoyed by 50 Saturday at Methodist Church

The second reunion of recent weeks in Cass City brought together the Class of 1921 of our local high school for a celebration of their 25th anniversary. It was held Saturday, June 8. A banquet had been arranged for with the ladies of the Methodist Church, and that evening a total of fifty persons were present, amid festive surroundings, for a dinner and program which "We wouldn't have missed for anything," as your reporter was frequently told.

To open the program, some songs reminiscent of the early '20's were led by Miss Marie Gemmill, with Mrs. Belva Tibbals Lyons as pianist, after which a welcome to all class members and guests was extended by Frederick H. Pinney. The remainder of the program had been modeled after the "Class Day" exercises put on by the class 25 years ago, and with the same persons participating.

Mrs. Lillian Rogers Bruckner, under the heading "Salutatory," and Mildred Fritz, in the farewell at the end of the program, both brought just the right amount of serious thought into their short talks to give a balance for the rest of the program. J. C. Hutchinson as class historian and Gillies Brown, using the title "Just Gossip," used their parts of the evening largely with reminiscences of 25 years ago, bringing many a good laugh from their audience. Another feature of the program which created much amusement was a re-reading of the "Class Prophecy" by Mrs. Helen Craig Ramsey, as she gave it originally. It was followed by a roll call, conducted by Glenn Bixby, in which each of the 26 class members who were present was asked to give briefly his own history during the intervening years since 1921.

Midway in the program various gifts and prizes were awarded by Mrs. Alexandra McKenzie Carnegie, including corsages for Mildred Fritz and Marie Gemmill, both of whom had served in the WACs during World War II and were the only members of the class in the armed forces. Mrs. Caroline F. Bigelow, the only member of the 1921 faculty who was present, and Mrs. Willis Campbell also received corsages. The other prizes were awarded to the class member who had the oldest child, the youngest child, who had been married the longest, the shortest, had the most children, was the baldest, etc., and the selection of the winners provided much merriment. Mrs. Carnegie, whose hobby is her work with ceramics, also presented favors to each member of the class earrings for the ladies, and ashtrays for the men, all made by herself.

"I have been very pleased to receive the Cass City paper. I received four in the last two weeks. I would read them and then pass them on to Don Shagena, whom I just met here in Korea. He's also from Cass City. I'll tell you how I met him because it surely was a strange way.

"One day after I finished most of my work the first sergeant came to me and said I had a phone call coming in at six o'clock. When I received the call a voice said, 'Guess who this is, Marshall?' Thinking it was some one of the company playing a trick I never guessed until he said, 'This is Jim Schmeck. Come down and get me. I'm in Inchon.' I got my truck and went after him. Jim got an overnight pass so he slept with me that night. Jim had received my address from Dick Root, whom he met in China only a few days before that.

Mizener Favors Equal Weight Tax Division

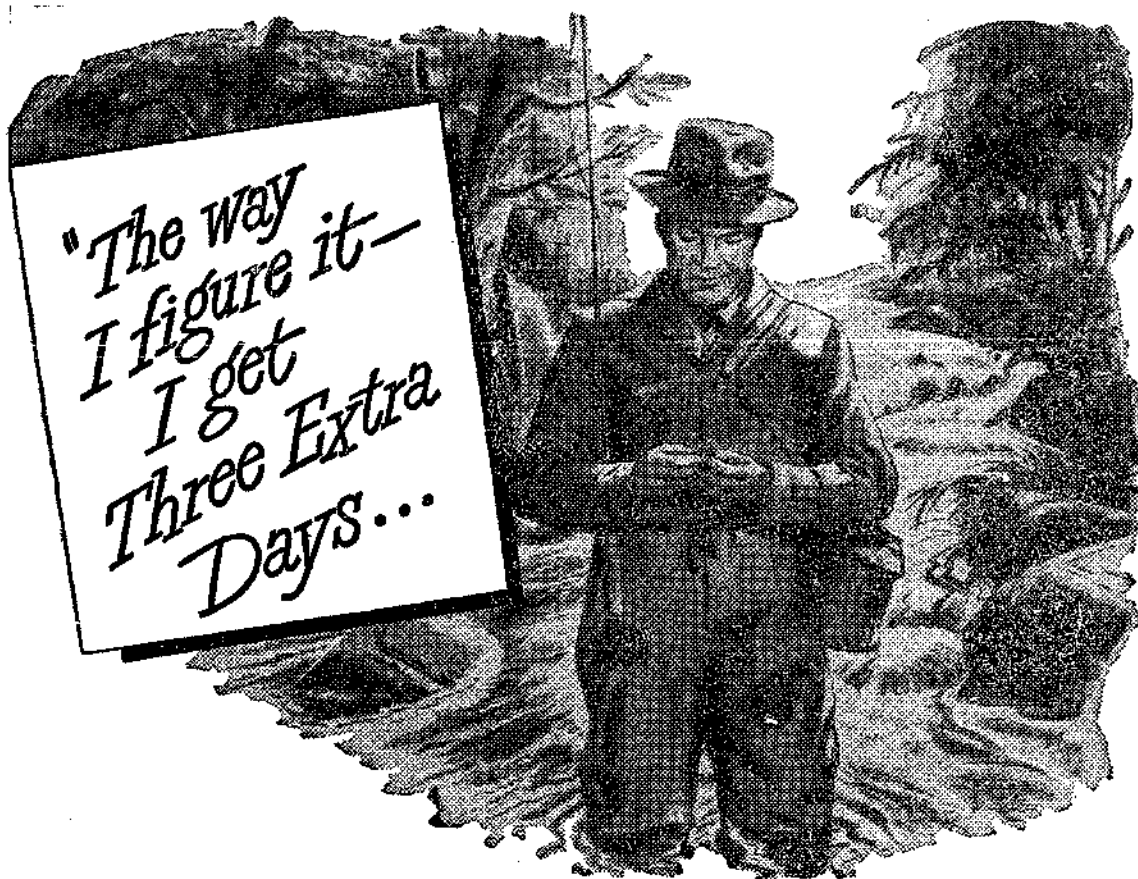

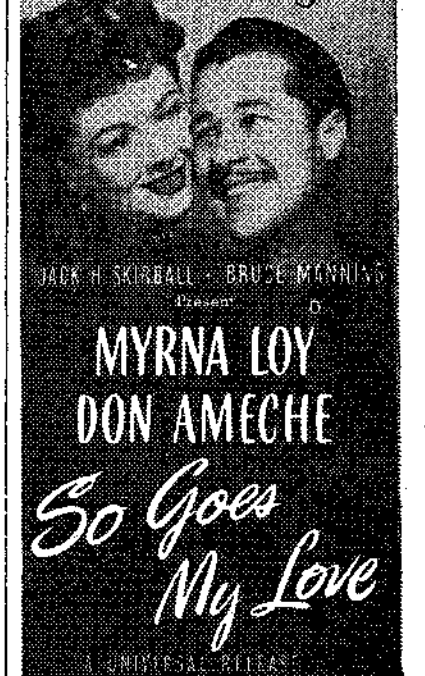

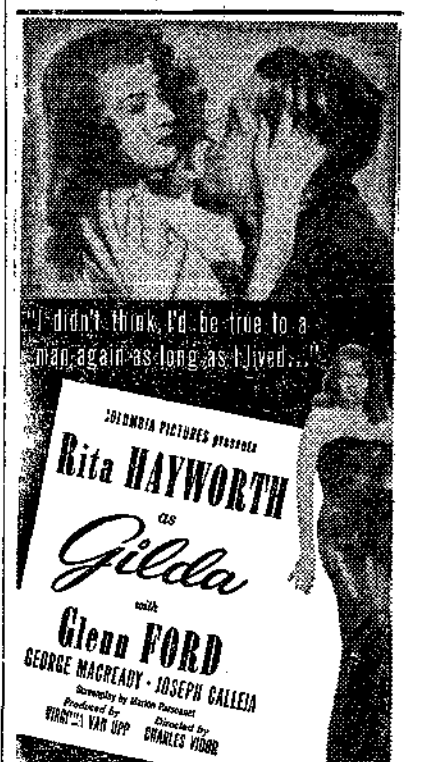
