Bowlers, Attention!

At a recent meeting of its officers, several changes were made in the rules of the City Bowling League that will govern this season's bowling and we print the following information for the benefit of the individuals who plan to become members this season. Everything possible will be done to keep teams intact and to discourage delinquency in members being absent.

This season a bowler will be required to purchase a membership card at a cost of \$3.00 as he signs up to bowl in the first schedule; however if he meets all requirements of the league rules, he will receive back the full amount of his \$3.00 entry fee by being allowed to bowl the last three weeks of the schedule at no cost. Each member shall pay \$1.00 per week to cover lines and dues whether he bowls with his team or not, unless a satisfactory substitution is made, in which case the sub shall pay the

Where a member is absent without his place being filled by a sub, his weekly dues will be divided, with 50c going to the alleys and 50c to the league, with payments to be made to the team captain. If, after a bowler has purchased a \$3.00 membership, he finds he will be unable to continue the schedule, he may dispose of his card to a substitute at its face value and the sub, holding such card and assuming the responsibilities of a member, shall be entitled to bowl the last three weeks of the schedule free. If a member leaves the schedule before its completion and without securing a substitute, he shall forfeit his rights to his \$3.00 entry fee.

The league will operate this season on a 70% handicap basis and the four point system will be used, with one point for each game won and one point to the team with the highest pin totals in each three game series.

Plans are to open the first schedule on Monday, September 9, and bowlers may sign up commencing August 15. All entries must be in by September 1, to allow time to make up teams and secure necessary printed schedules before opening night. Membership cards may be secured at either bank and newcomers to the community as well as all former members are welcome to join the league.

The annual city tournment will be held the week immediately following the close of the second schedule in 1947.



The total cost for materials of the lean-to shown in the sketch would



for producing Grade A milk. The six-stall parlor is large enough for a 30-cow herd. It does increase the amount of bedding needed by nearly 50 per cent. This results in a corresponding increase in manure value.

One of the maiun advantages of this type construction is that the herd may be added to without expense of new stanchions.



> Because local police and sheriffs were zealous of their rights, the legislature stipulated that the state police shall not intervene in the local jurisdiction of other police agencies unless so ordered by the Governor. The procedure is interesting. Here is the law:

"The commissioner shall have authority, upon the order of the Governor, to call upon any sheriff or other police officer of any county, city, township or village, within the limits of their respective jurisdictions, for aid and assistance in the performance of any duty imposed by this act.

Refusal or neglect by a local official to cooperate with the state police in law enforcement would subject said officer, the legislature decreed, to removal from office on grounds of "misfeasance."

Then if the violation continues, it is within the citizen's right to appeal direct to the Governor of Michigan who then can ask for an official investigation and report and finally can instruct the State Police to enforce the law.

It is obvious that, in the above procedure, the power of the Governor is great. He is the key to good governorment.

One of the postwar plans of the Michigan State Police is a training school for municipal policemen and firemen. The school would be administered jointly by the deparment and Michigan State College. 




