Woman's World **Glamorize Ugly Duckling Beds** With Slipcovered Headboards

If you're one of the thousands of war brides still waiting to see your dream home come true, there are several ways of making your life at present one of comfort and pleasantness. There's no need to put up with sad-looking family hand-medowns if you can run a sewing machine or take a needle in your hand and transform today's fabrics into things of beauty and loveliness.

A few yards of printed or plain cotton or rayon can be turned out into handsome quilted and appliqued finishes for headboard slipcovers after a few lesson's at your local sewing center. You can, for example, pad a slip cover and work out a quilting design at the same time with just a little instruction and turn the white elephant of a bed into a thing of beauty.

Checked gingham, flower sprigged or striped fabrics are best for a quilted design which is easy to apply with the quilting attachment to the machine. If your heart is set on one of the lovely appliqued designs. your best choice is a plain background which sets off the floral designs of the applique. The zigzagger attachment will do the job neatly and in very short order.

wooden bedsteads Outmoded should be cut down to modern proportions before you attempt covering the headboard. Perhaps a handy carpenter or even friend husband would enjoy doing the job in one of his spare moments. If you're not quite certain of the lines to use, then check over some modern pieces before you attempt to start the remodeling.


You may even use a studio couch or box spring mattress combination if you don't have a regular bed. In this case, attach a headboard made of compo or plywood cut to bed wiath,

Take Measurements First

When Making Covering To determine the fabric necessary for the headboard, measure across the top of it for width and then from top to bottom for depth. Lay the material lengthwise across the front of the headboard to avoid seamsdown the center front. Join narrow

Floral Printed Remnants Easy to Use for Appliques

For an appliqued slip cover, cut out designs from a floral printed remnant and then applique to the plain fabric slip cover, using a zigzagger attachment. Both of these headboard effects can be enhanced

with matching bedspreads, the quilting and applique work being done in much the same fashion as for the headboard. Frilly ruffles that complement

headboard drama can be stitched for bedspreads with the ruffler attachment. This gadget ruffles and stitches all in one operation. If you're a career girl and house-

keeper combination, then select the bedspread with care. You'll want one that fits perfectly without too much fussing-one that you can swiftly maneuver into place in the morning and snap off quickly in the evening. A simple quilted bedspread or a cotton appliqued one will lay nicely on the bed, and will be simple as far as care is concerned.

Of course, if you want more glamour, you can go in for the frilly, ruffied types made of sheer materials like organdie and dotted swiss. but this is something strictly feminine, and you don't want to subject your brand new husband to too

The body of Vernal Julian Frye, with ropes trussed about his ankles, knees and thighs, tape over his mouth and a noose about his neck, was found by his wife in his photographic dark room, and in exactly the same position as the grim picture of himself that was attached to a wire used for drying film. Mrs. Frye told authorities her busband was working in the dark room when she left for church. She said she never before had seen the picture. 

Prompt Delivery of Cars

Two Years Off, Official Says WASHINGTON. - It will be two years before all motorists can get 'new cars at fair prices on prompt delivery," Pres. C. E. Wilson of General Motors corporation predicted.

Wilson reported, in answer to questions after a kincheon address at the National Press club, that changes in passenger car models between 1948 and 1947 "won't be very radical." He said prices will not come down very soon. "I don't expect to see Chevrolets

selling for \$500 or \$600 in my lifetime.' Wilson told a questioner who asked whether there would be a return to the prewar value of the customers' dollar. But he predicted that the average person "from now on" will find it easier to get a car. He predicted the industry will turn out five million automobiles and trucks next year.



Incorporated into the miniature barn are models of two types of grain elevators showing the methods by which the time can be saved in moving grain to the barn and the animals,







The tolerance as provisionally set by the government is seven parts of DDT to one million parts of pears or apples.


Defying Quota in Red Zone
