

Rats Breed Heavily
Rats reproduce very rapidly, as many as six to eight litters a year being produced. These offspring breed and reproduce at an age of from three to four months. Though litters have been known to run from 6 to 20, the average is from 9 to 10.

Lice Affect Hogs
Lice lower the vitality of hogs and make them more susceptible to diseases. Waste motor oil is effective in controlling the pests. It may be applied by sprayer, mop, or by rubbing or oiling posts.

Cooling Pressure Saucepans
Unlike ordinary pressure cookers the pressure saucepan may, when desired, be cooled quickly with cold water without danger of breaking. Pressure saucepans are not recommended for canning as there is no way of accurately gauging the pressure and temperature.

Bring Back 'Dead' Dogs
Dogs which have been "dead" for as long as eight minutes have been brought back to life in recent laboratory experiments. Revival was accomplished after a period of no breathing and no heartbeat by the use of a pump to replace heart action, stimulant drugs and artificial respiration.

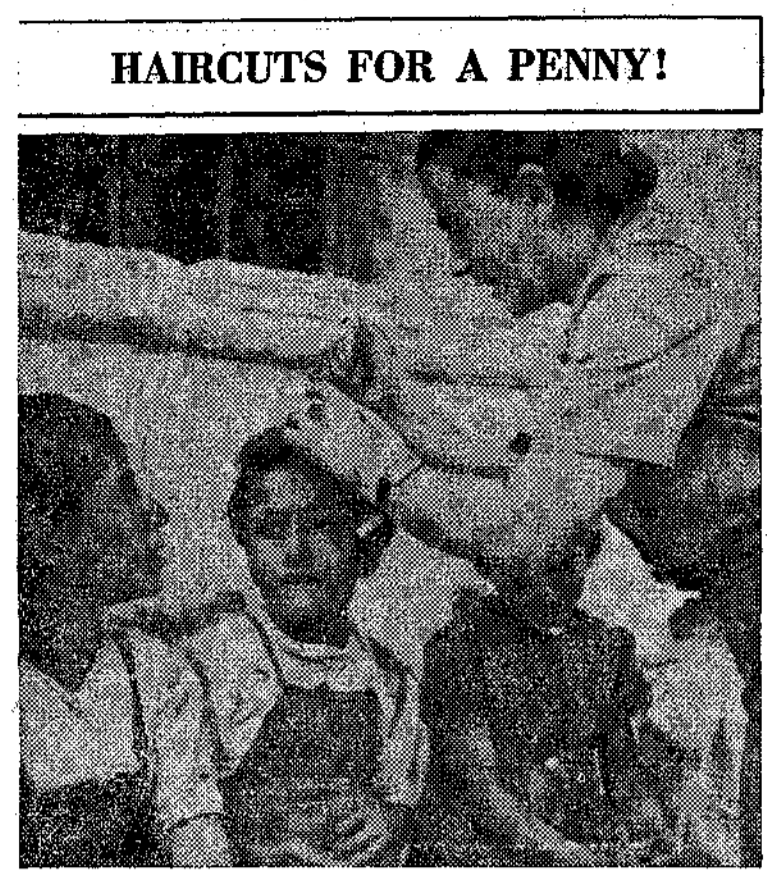

Concluded from page 1. of state senators who prevented the necessary two-thirds majority vote for approval. Because of his experience with certain lobbyists during the Lansing Grand Jury investigations, Governor Sigler has carefully avoided applying political pressure on members of the Legislature and hence engaging in lobbying for his own administrative measures.

The Senate Judiciary Committee on Tuesday (March 25) held a public hearing on proposed legislation to register lobbyists at Lansing. The Capitol Club of Lansing, whose membership comprises secretaries of 37 state trade associations, presented a formal statement in which the club raised no objection to registration of legislative agents or payment of a registration fee to a state office.

Instead of having ample funds to get things done, Governor Sigler is faced with the dire and grim prospect of a staggering deficit. The voters of Michigan approved a \$270,000,000 bonus for veterans of World War II without authorizing any taxation whereby such payments are to be financed.

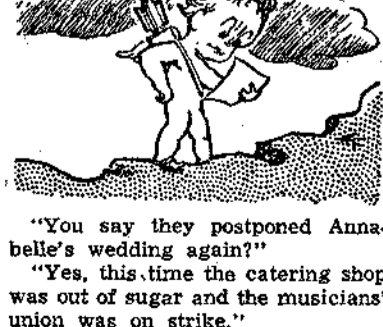

Billionth of Gram Weighed by Gadget

New Instrument Expected to Be Help to Science.

EVANSTON, ILL. — Development of a highly sensitive electronic instrument capable of detecting the presence of some compounds weighing only a billionth of a gram was announced by Northwestern University.

The university said the instrument, called the fluorimeter, could complete in a few minutes some nutritional experiments formerly requiring months. It added the instrument would find wide use in chemical laboratories and assist in the standardization of drug products and in the control of quality in food production.

Dr. Theodore E. Friedemann, associate professor of physiology, who developed the instrument with cooperation of George S. Liebeck, American Telephone and Telegraph Co. engineer, described its operation as follows:

All compounds in nature absorb light. Some, such as vitamins, emit light in higher wave lengths. This light, called fluorescence, is invisible to the naked eye in the quantities measured, but readily detected with the instrument. Computations determine the quantity in a compound from which the glow emanates.

Chemists now can determine in a few minutes the quantity of a vitamin in a food or in the tissue of a vitamin deficient patient.

"The development of this instrument represents a stage in the development of more sensitive devices needed for better understanding of life processes and the effects of food and environment on those processes," Dr. Friedemann said.

Better Diets

In the last 37 years the consumption of citrus fruit has increased 350 per cent and that of potatoes and grains decreased 30 per cent, according to a report analyzing per capita food consumption in the United States. During the recent war, the nutritive value of the average civilian diet actually improved. The mineral and vitamin value of the daily meals have improved due to higher consumption of milk, meat, eggs, green and yellow vegetables and citrus fruits and to bread and flour enrichment.

Disposal Pit
One of the best investments on a farm is a disposal pit for dead birds and other small animals. A pit 6 to 8 feet in diameter and 8 feet deep, walled up with rocks and covered with 2 feet of dirt, will provide a place for all birds which die during the course of several years. A 12 inch tile intake in the top covered by a small tub is convenient and it keeps the odor in and the flies out. If the dead birds accumulate faster than they decay, add quick lime occasionally.

U. S. to Control Foreign Relief

Congress Will Be Asked for Liberal Appropriation For 1947 Activities.

WASHINGTON.—A "generous appropriation" will be asked of congress for 1947 relief activities abroad — but only for countries which can definitely prove their need, it was disclosed by Acting Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

Because of the economic revival of many liberated countries Acheson said there probably would be "only three or four countries in Europe requiring free relief in order to avoid suffering and hardship."

Under the American plan, Acheson continued, governments "will be compelled to distribute food on the basis of need." "They will not be allowed to feed their political supporters and starve their political opponents."

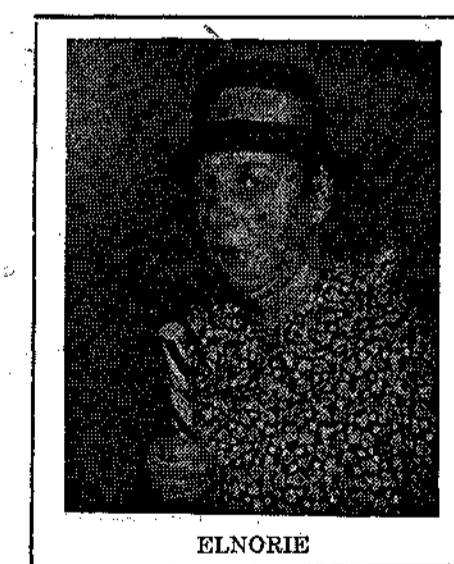

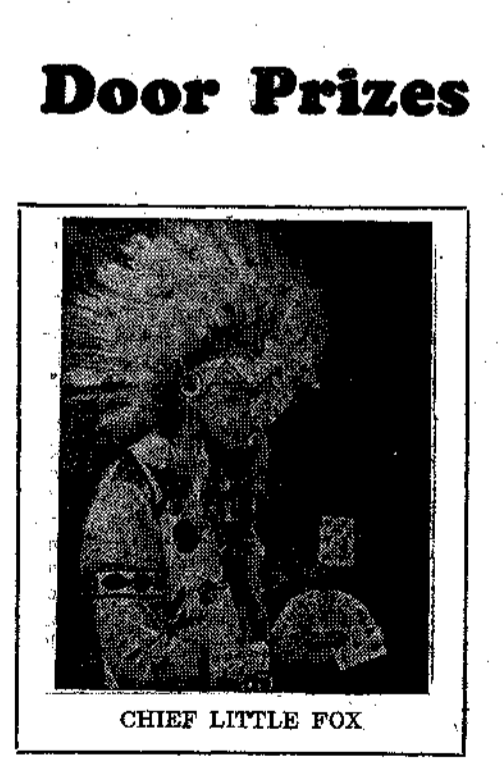

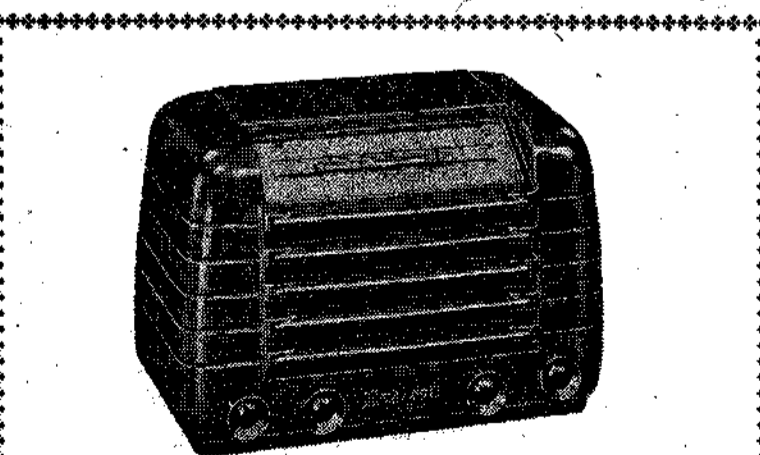

How 45 per cent superphosphate drilled with alfalfa seed at the rate of 100 pounds per acre not only stimulates growth of the seedlings but

also gives marked protection against winter-killing was described by Prof. H. E. Myers, agronomist at Kansas State college.

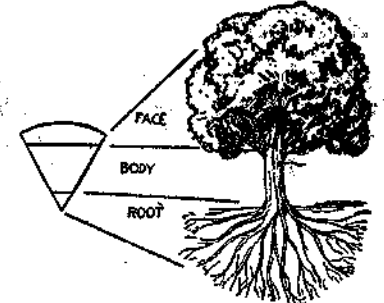
The beneficial effects of the fertilizer treatment are illustrated in the accompanying photographs taken in an alfalfa field in Kansas.

The alfalfa was seeded August 15 and 16. The fertilizer was placed in the same row with the seed. The last two rounds were drilled without fertilizer.

As shown above, there is an almost complete absence of plants in the center unfertilized strip as the result of winter-killing. The crowns of the unfertilized plants were about three inches above the soil surface by spring. The fertilized plants remained in place, thrifty and undamaged.

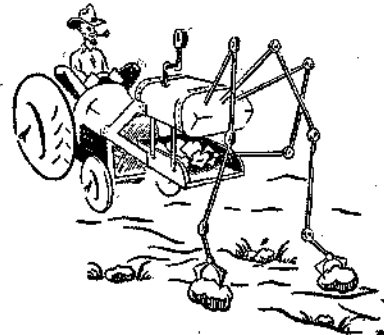

Harvest Connecticut's Big Annual Rock Crop

The machine will be a revelation to gardeners and farmers with aching backs. It is also possible that the artist's drawing will be a revelation to the manufacturer of the stone picker.

DDT Spray Readily Removed From Fruit

DDT residue on apples and pears do not present a serious difficulty according to research results reported by Dr. J. E. Hoskins, University of California. Any excess residue can be reduced readily to below tolerance allowed by washing the fruit with detergents.

The tolerance as provisionally set by the government is seven parts of DDT to one million parts of pears or apples.

Labor Saving Methods Around Barn

A statewide program featuring labor-saving methods around the barn reached Tuscola County this week.

Norris W. Wilber, county agricultural agent, received from A. B. Love, emergency farm labor supervisor of the extension service of Michigan State College, a working model of a miniature barn.

It is one of the 40 identical models made available to county extension offices in Michigan. Designed to show arrangements in the barn which will save steps in storing grain and feed and in moving feed to the animals, the model indicates the proper locations of bins, dairy cows and elevators.

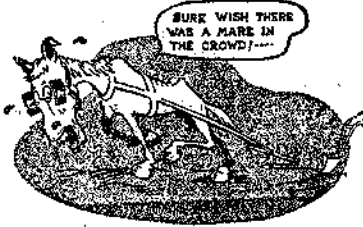
Incorporated into the miniature barn are models of two types of grain elevators showing the methods by which the time can be saved in moving grain to the barn and the animals.

First built by Albert Festerling, emergency farm labor assistant in Bay County, the model barn was adapted from recommendations of the departments of agricultural engineering and dairy at MSC. The Emergency Farm Labor officials then planned assembly line production of the models. They were constructed under the direction of Festerling in the office of E. R. Hancock, Shiawassee County agent.

One model has been assigned to every two adjoining counties for use by the agents to acquaint farmers with possibilities of saving time and labor through the proper use and arrangement of mechanical barn equipment.

This exhibit will be shown at farm meetings about the county during the remainder of March and the first two weeks of April. When not in use at meetings it will be on display in the Court House.

Long Stolen Tchaikovsky Paper Found in Library

MOSCOW, RUSSIA. — The Moscow News said a manuscript of Tchaikovsky's "Nutteracker Suite" stolen nearly half a century ago from the St. Petersburg conservatory library had been found in a load of waste paper. A young Leningrad composer named Zablotsky discovered the score in paper he had bought to cover his apartment walls before hanging wallpaper, the newspaper said. It added that the manuscript, turned over to the Soviet government for deposit in the Tchaikovsky museum, was believed to be the one from which the composer conducted, subdivisions on it being lettered in blue pencil.

Farmers Are Jailed for Defying Quota in Red Zone

BERLIN. — A Soviet source said that German farmers in the Russian occupation zone who willfully reneged on delivery of fixed harvest quotas were being imprisoned. The Russian-controlled news agency reported that two farmers had been sentenced to serve terms of six and eight months in prison for "maliciously withholding part of their quotas" from the state collectors.

BIENNIAL - SPRING ELECTION

Notice is hereby given, that a Biennial - Spring Election will be held in the Township of Grant, County of Huron, State of Michigan at Grant Township Hall, within said township, on Monday, April 7, 1947 for the purpose of voting for the election of the following officers, viz.: State Officers: Justices of the Supreme Court, Regents of the University, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Member of the State Board of Education, Members of the State Board of Agriculture, State Highway Commissioner.

Propositions: No. 1 — A Joint Resolution of the 1947 Legislature proposing an amendment to Section 23 of Article 7 of the State Constitution, relative to the non-partisan primary election of judicial officers in cases of no contest.

No. 2 — A Joint Resolution of the 1947 Legislature proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 12 of the State Constitution to permit corporations to hold real estate, not actually occupied in the exercise of its franchises, for a period of not to exceed 30 years, in cities or villages of over 5,000 population and within an area not exceeding 2 miles of the boundary limits thereof.

Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls

Election Revision of 1943—No. 72—Chapter VIII—Part 4. Section 1. On the day of any election, polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until eight o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

Section 2. Unless otherwise specified, the hours for the opening and closing of polls and for the conducting of elections, shall be governed by Eastern Standard time.

The polls of said election will be open at seven o'clock a. m. and will remain open until eight o'clock p. m. Dated this 19th day of March, 1947.
