ship is 224, and a budget of \$10,280 was raised last year. Located in one of the industrial sections of the city, a large number of folk have come and gone in the membership of the church during the time the Parkers have been at the church.

"As a member of the Ministers' association, Mr. Parker served one term as its president, and as chairman of the juvenile court committee, he directed the Sunday school work at the juvenile home for two years.

"He served on the board of directors of the Y. M. C. A., and as committeeman on the Veterans' Council. He was counselor for the Oakland County Christian Endeavor Union at the time of the Youth Good Friday services were started.

"Other civic services include chaplaincy at the state hospital and at many city commission meetings. He has served on Community chest drives and citywide evangelistic committees.

"Mrs. Parker has been active in citywide interests as well as the regular duties of the church. She was treasurer of the first World Day of Prayer board and was treasurer of the Council of Church Women for nine years, and has been active in W. C. T. U. activities."

**Farm Fire Fighting**

The first five minutes are the most important in fighting farm fires. Engineers of the department of agriculture say that in fire fighting on farms, five minutes or less may be all the time available to rescue the family, send out the alarm, and fight the fire before it gets beyond control. Every farm family needs a simple fire fighting plan, according to engineers. The plan needs to include quickly removing all persons to safety, prompt signaling for help, skillfully fighting a small fire before it spreads, protecting other buildings, livestock and property, and fighting the fire with neighborhood cooperation.

In fixing home-salted nuts, use one teaspoon of salt and only two teaspoons of cooking oil, or melted vegetable or table fat for each cup of nuts. Just enough fat to cover the nuts in the skillet is all you need.

**Cleaning Coat Collar**  
If the wool collar on a dark coat needs cleaning, lay the coat on a table with the inside open and flat. Then brush the collar to remove loose dust. After moistening a piece of dark wool cloth with cleaning fluid, sponge the soiled part with light brushing motions. Several light applications will do a better job than too much fluid used at once. Next, pat dry the material with a dry wool cloth and finally, brush the wool with a medium-soft brush.

### Michigan Needs 25,000 Migrants for Farm Labor in State

Michigan needs 25,000 migrant workers each year, says A. B. Love, state emergency farm labor supervisor at Michigan State College. The reduction in total farm labor force of the nation makes competition for these workers greater than before the war.

The policy of the farm labor program this year will be the placement of Michigan workers first, domestic migrants second, and foreign workers last. It is expected that foreign labor will be reduced by 30 per cent, but those remaining will not be used if they are replacing American

citizens who desire farm work. Indications point to an increased movement of migrant workers, both Texas Mexican and others, into Michigan. Wage differences may cause considerable shifting of labor in the state because of workers hunting for employers who will pay higher wages. Love points out that the present high cost of living combined with farmers' beliefs that agricultural prices may be reduced at harvest time may cause wage differences.

The emergency farm labor program has been extended to December 31, 1947. This year's program is designed to place growers in a position where they will have reasonable amounts of labor in future years. Farm labor assistants in each county will emphasize the development of better em-

ployer-employee relations, recruitment and placement of workers, their housing, training and problems of social environment. With Michigan's constant need for outside workers, Love points out that now is the time to build a reputation that will attract desirable migrants to the state in future years.

5. At the close of the growing season he will harvest his crop according to suggestions furnished by the County 4-H Club agent.

6. Make an exhibit of three stalks of each variety at the County Fair.

7. Make a 10-ear exhibit of each variety at a county corn show to be held later in the fall.

8. Complete regular 4-H crops record book.

County Contests and Awards— Suitable awards will be given to a certain number of the best 4-H corn growers in the county. The basis of selecting the winners will be as follows:

- Average yield per acre.
- Cultural practices used.
- Quality of records kept.
- Quality of exhibit made.
- Other 4-H club activities.

Grind meat coarsely the first time and as finely as desired the second time. Double grinding thoroughly mixes fat, lean and seasoning.
