





One part fat to three or four parts lean makes sausage of best quality which will fry itself and not be too dry. Add five teaspoons salt. four teaspoons sage and two teaspoons black pepper for each four pounds of mixed meat. For even distribution, sprinkle the seasoning over the meat before it is ground. Grind meat coarsely the first time and as finely as desired the second time. Double grinding thoroughly: mixes fat, lean and seasoning.
