### **Penicillin** Aids **Scarlet Fever**

### Halts Complications From Disease.

PHILADELPHIA.-Dr. Joseph C. Doane, clinical professor of medicine at Temple University Medical of the new wonder drugs, had virtually altered the entire course of istry here. Also, there will be a scarlet fever. He said that with Community Family Night June 27 of scarlet fever under observation are many-are practically obliterated.'

Dr. Doane said that "the whole course of this disease has been changed by penicillin and streptomycin." He added that with sulfa drugs, the mortality rate of pneumonia was cut to 8 per cent. l Marie.

#### Gives Warning.

He warned, however, against indiscriminate use of the new wonder drugs. "Many doctors reach for penicillin before they reach for their stethoscopes."

Use of the miracle drugs "as gaining. shock drugs" was described by the speaker, who added that while the medical profession has made vast strides in use of these drugs since 1943, there is still much to be learned;

Dr. Harold A. Zintel of University of Pennsylvania hospital declared that penicillin has given the medical profession an entirely new field of therapy.

Dr. Zintel said that penicillin has "proved one of the most potent therapeutic agents known. Especially is it valuable in surgery." Sharing medical profession's respect with penicillin, he said, is streptomycin, which "has proved to be a valuable agent in many cases where penicillin and the sulfa drugs have failed." Dr. Zintel said that a combination of penicillin and streptomycin has been "most effective in the treat-ment of peritonitis" and the oral use of streptomycin "is highly satisfactory as an agent for reducing the bacteria in the system" prior to, operations for intestinal disorders.

Mortality Rate Lowered. Dr. Isadore S. Ravdin, professor of surgery and head of the surgical department of University of Pennsylvania, declared in a prepared paper that cancer of the intestine is no respecter of age.

The disease, he declared, is "very common and while as a rule it seems most frequently to occur in those past 40, it can occur at a very much earlier age."

Dr. Ravdin, in his paper read by Dr. Kendall A. Elsom of University of Pennsylvaria hospital, declared that through decompression of the intestines, blood transfusions and the use of drugs, the medical profession has reduced the mortality rate of this disease to a point "where there is less risk to resection of the intestines than there is to operations for a ruptured appen-







DURHAM, N. H.-A new sawdust plastic has been created at University of New Hampshire which has many uses and promises to solve the problem of salvaging sawdust and wood shavings in lumber operations.

The new product, made by combining green saw dust with resin as a binder, is expected to use every bit of wood waste now lost in the forests when trees are cut down,

It is a low-cost, mass-production product. It can be put in, a mold, shaped into whatever article is desired, heat-treated and painted exactly like wood.

#### 580,000 Are Let Out of Navy At Great Lakes in One Year

CHICAGO.-Men were discharged from the navy at the Great Lakes naval training center in 1946 at a rate 17 times greater than inductions, headquarters of the 9th naval district reported. The report showed 580,000 discharged and 34,-000 inducted into the navy at Great Lakes.

The navy said its conversion to a peacetime basis was virtually completed and the big task ahead of the naval district in 1947 is organization of a reserve training program.

Personnel at Great Lakes decreased from 36,000 in 1945 to 16,-500 in 1946.

**Dismiss Indictment of Man** Who Once Slapped Tojo

TOKYO, JAPAN. - The international war crimes tribunal dismissed the indictment against Dr. Shumei Okawa, who startled the early days of the trial by slapping Hideki Tojo on the head. The tribunal acted after receiving medical reports that Okawa, who had been on trial in absentia, was incapable of "conducting his defense." Okawa, wartime propagandist, had been confined to a mental institution under treatment for a brain disease. The judges ordered him kept in custody.







**Poisonous Waste Is Killing** 

The deadly tide is composed of a previously unknown type of plankton, the poisonous waste from which are killing the fish, Dr. F. G. Walton Smith, University of Miami director of marine laboratory, reported.

Dr. Smith said Miami scientists had concluded that the plankton, which in normal amounts serves as the basic food for all marine life, has always been in the gulf, but that some freak of nature has caused this particular type to reproduce in astronomical numbers.

#### **Caste System in Cemeteries** Is Abolished by U. S. Army

WASHINGTON. - The army ordered that the caste system be abolished in military cemeteries. A directive by War Secretary Pat-

terson said no distinction should be made between location of graves of officers and enlisted men in new sections of national cemeteries. "The policy of providing uniform burial facilities without distinction as to rank or race of deceased veterans will be effected as new sections are laid out," the directive saið.

The army said that because of the large number of veterans now entitled to burial in national cemeteries an expansion of facilities has become necessary. This will be accomplished largely through additions to existing cemeteries.
