Tuesday night several members of the Gavel Club and other citizens witnessed the "preview" of the city park's new lighting system and were well pleased as they saw the floodlights turned onto the football and softball fields. They were thoroughly convinced that Cass City has the best lighted playground obtainable.

Twelve poles each 60 feet in height hold 88 floodlights, each with a 1,500 wattage and their reflectors. When all are turned on there will be a total of 132,000 watts in use. These will consume 132 k. w. per hour.







#### **Truman Proclaims Machines** Probe Oct. 5-11 as Fire Heart Secrets Prevention Week

Electrocardiagraph Shows **Currents Generated in** Vital Organ.

CHICAGO. -- Exposure of the deepest secrets of the human heart is threatened by scientists. Not the figurative secrets, of course, but the physical ones.

The other day a group of curious laymen heard their own heartbeats by broadcast over a loudspeaker, read a new tape record of heart action and saw a television production of heart sounds.

#### Fight Heart Disease.

This demonstration of scientific equipment now in use in the continuing fight on heart disease was staged for the first time publicly by the Chicago Heart association, with the press as an audience.

It was part of the association's educational program in its campaign to raise \$100,000 for research study of rheumatic fever, hypertension and cardiovascular diseases.

The electrocardiagraph made an instantaneous record of electrical currents generated by the vital organ which could be read off a ticker tape. The old instrument involved photographs and delay in developing the film.

A fluorocardiagraph showed the movement of the various chambers of the heart and a cardioscope made a visual image of the heart sounds which the person being examined could witness.

It was the phonocardiagraph which aroused the greatest interest. Use Microphone.

A microphone was placed over the subject's heart. The sounds were amplified through a loudspeaker at a decibel level that en-

abled everybody in the room to ihear the beats. To a layman's ears, it might have been Gene Krupa on the drums, a jungle rhythm or the sound of runaway horses. But to the attuned ears of heart specialists it was a step forward in the battle against the great killer, heart disease.


"We're still in the exploratory stage," explained Dr. Louis N. Katz of the association board. "The machines were developed at Temple university and have been used for two years.

"They give you a more continuous record so you can tell what various heart motions mean." Dr. Morris Fishbein of American Medical association, present for the big task was to train men to be able to interpret the records of the machines.

DDT might poison the soil and that Don't it had permitted some pests to increase because it kills the parasites which destroy them.

"In addition to the soil hazard," he said, "it has been found recently there is a considerable accumulation in the meat of animals that are fed on forage dusted with DDT. It builds up in the meat, particularly in the fats, and where forage crops are fed that have a high DDT residue, the amount that accumulates in the animal fat is rather estound-:ing.'

He said that its toxicity was not destroyed by preparing the meat over a fire.

Dr. Annand said there was more concern over secretion of DDT in milk, because it concentrated in the butterfat. The department, he added, was not recommending DDT for protection. forage crops to be fed to milk cows "because of that hazard."
