

Lighted Athletic Field To Be Dedicated Oct. 10

Parade, Band Music and Short Program to Precede Caro-Cass City Game

On Friday night, Oct. 10, Cass City will dedicate its new athletic field. The occasion will culminate more than a year of work and planning by a considerable number of its citizens.

Cass City High School will be host to its old and friendly rival, Caro, in football. Local people are certainly pleased and more than happy that Caro will join in the dedication program.

The dedication committee, realizing that those who will be here are coming primarily to see the football game, have purposely planned a short and "to the point" dedication service. There will be a short parade from the high school to the field. Marching will be the massed bands of Caro and Cass City and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. At the field, the flag raising will be conducted by the Veterans Color Guard. During this ceremony the massed bands will play. The invocation will be given by the Reverend Arnold Olsen and the address of the evening will be delivered by Frederick Pinney, president of the Village of Cass City. At the conclusion of President Pinney's words the game will begin.

A great deal of planning and work has been done in this project to give to Cass City a lighted athletic field. It is the committee's fond hope that it will be a source of pleasure and entertainment not only to the youth of this community but to everyone.

They want all to be here on the night of October 10 that all may share the community pride that goes with the realization that Cass City now has as well lighted an athletic field as is possible for electrical engineering to give.

The field project has been sponsored by the Gavel Club. The club, however, realizes that the project could never have been brought to a reality if it were not for the generous response to the bond drive by many of the good people. The club wants to take this occasion to express their sincere thanks to all. The field, they know, will be a success and will be self liquidating in time.

Let all look forward to October 10 as one more step in making this community more progressive and a better and more pleasant place to live.

The dedication ceremony will begin at 7:45 p. m. Admission price will be sixty cents.

He served one year with the Ordnance Division of the United States Army, receiving his honorable discharge July 22, 1946. He served six months in Austria where he earned the rank of Corporal Technician 3. Since returning to civilian life he and his family made their home in this vicinity.

Mr. Cooke was a member of the Decota Mennonite Church in Detroit.

Mrs. Arnold Reagh Was First President of Spartan Wives

In the October issue of the Ladies' Home Journal appears an article entitled "Spartan Wives" which is an organization of wives of student veterans at Michigan State College at East Lansing. Of special interest to Cass City people is the fact that Florence Reagh, wife of Arnold Reagh, a former Cass City boy, was the first president of the club.

Spartan Wives is an experiment in community living in which the wives of student veterans have mutually solved the problems every young wife faces in a new community—loneliness, boredom, the success of her husband, the future of her children and the perplexing questions of political, economic and social life. Through the efforts of their organization (to which every one of the 2,500 wives at the college belongs) they are learning how to run their homes, become better mothers and citizens, all at the same time.

Today the wives publish their own newspaper, have their own radio program, run a library and have their own swimming, riding and crafts classes. They are working for a nursery school, better bus service, and movies for the married students' housing area.

Auto Injuries Are Fatal to Gagetown Young Man

John F. Schwartz, World War II Veteran, Died on Friday in Pigeon Hospital

John F. Schwartz, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Schwartz, of Gagetown, died Friday, Sept. 26, from injuries received in an automobile accident the previous Sunday. His death occurred at the Scheurer Hospital at Pigeon where the young man was taken from the scene of the accident at Bay Port. Clayton Roger Kendall, 24, of Greenleaf Township, driver of the automobile, was instantly killed when the car rolled over on a curve at the east Bay Port village limits, on M-25.

The remains of Mr. Schwartz were removed to the Hunter Funeral Home at Gagetown and remained there until funeral services Monday at 9 a. m. in St. Agatha Church in Gagetown. Rt. Rev. Msgr. John McCullough officiated and burial with military honors under the auspices of the American Legion, was in the church cemetery. Relatives and friends from a distance who attended the services came from Detroit, Uby, Hamtramck, Unionville, Owendale, Cass City and Sebewaing.

Mr. Schwartz was born June 15, 1927, on a farm near Sebewaing and came to Tuscola County in 1944. He entered service July 18, 1945, and became a PFC in the 16th Infantry Regiment. He was stationed at Fort Sheridan, Ill., and took his basic training at Camp Hood, Texas. He re-enlisted in the regular army Dec. 5, 1945, and saw service for one year, four months and 19 days in the European countries. PFC Schwartz returned home June 27, 1947, and received his discharge Aug. 4, 1947, at Camp Kilmer, New Jersey.

Surviving are his parents; three sisters, Eleanor, Gertrude and Patricia; and four brothers, Edward, George, Richard and Junior, all at home.

Michigan Mirror

Unlike the weather about which we talk constantly, yet never do anything about, Michigan rural health is due for improvement.

Here's a frank picture of the problem. It's not a pretty one.

Among Michigan rural youth, rejections for military service were higher than among city youths. Some of their physical defects were due—of all things—to faulty nutrition.

Because farmers have received only about one-tenth of the national income during the past decade or so, the following conditions prevailed in Michigan farm homes as of 1940.

Less than one-third had running water—a simple convenience that was available to 97 out of 100 Michigan city homes. Only one out of six farm homes had an indoor toilet, or a bath tub or shower. The city average was nine out of ten homes. One out of four farm homes had central heating; one of seven cooked with gas or electricity. One of eight had mechanical refrigeration; one of four had a telephone. In fact, in only one county—Washtenaw—did as many as one-half of the farm homes have a telephone.

Furthermore, better pay and a trend to specialization have combined to attract new doctors to cities. Alcona County, for example, had 2,732 persons per active physician in 1943 (a war-time year) as compared with 828 persons per doctor in Wayne County, Detroit. Lack of modern hospitals in rural areas also contributed to the steady decline of physicians there.

What's happening to change this picture? Well, two things among others.

First: Price inflation has set a new high mark for farm income. Cash receipts in 1946 were 208 per cent above the average for 1935 to 1939, according to Uncle Sam's. Concluded on page 8.

VETERANS NEWS

From the OFFICE OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS LANSING

New Standard for Training in Agriculture.

The passage of P. L. 377 by the 80th Congress establishes new standards for training in agriculture. Effective Sept. 1, 1947, the combination of classroom study and practical farming is treated on the same basis as other full-time institutional training, wherein full responsibility for proper direction and study lies with the faculty offering the course; in Michigan, the veterans' institute.

On-farm training can be briefly described as follows: 1) Full-time training consisting of enrollment in an approved institution for attendance in organized classes. Hours fixed for classes remain at 200 per year. 2) One hundred hours of instruction on-farm by a qualified instructor. 3) Specific work and study assignments to be carried out by the trainee between visits of the instructor.

The length of the training program is dependent on the need of the veteran within the limits of his eligible time. The state remains as the approval agency for institutions offering courses and the individual plans submitted by veterans seeking to enroll.

Application is made directly to the approved institution (veterans' institute) in the community. New forms which will come into use are V. A. 7-1921, to be used in making application to the institution; and V. A. 7-1922, for reporting earnings to V. A. during the training period.

The Veterans Administration will pay the same scale of tuition and instruction fees charged other students in similar courses, or an agreed rate determined to be fair and reasonable. Books and other supplies needed in classroom work will be paid for, but no supplies or equipment necessary to the operation of the farm will be included.

Subsistence payments remain the same: \$65.00 for single veterans, and \$90.00 for those with dependents, subject to the \$200.00 ceiling covering total earnings and subsistence.

Village Trustees Get Ready for Heavy Snowfall

Authorize Village Engineer to Order an Efficient Plow for Snow Removal

Remembering the heavy snowfall of last winter, village trustees decided to be adequately prepared for snow removal the coming season and Village Engineer C. U. Brown was told to purchase an efficient plow. The authorization was voted at the council meeting Tuesday.

Mr. Brinker of Brinker & Armstrong informed the council of the plans his firm had of building an addition to their lumber warehouse. The new building, 66x84 feet in size, will be of cement block construction and will be situated across the alley to the north of their present building on East Main St. The plans of the addition were discussed in regard to meeting the standards of the fire zone.

Mr. Molecko expressed his desire to secure sewer connection to the old power house building he purchased from the village so he may start factory operations there. State health regulations will not permit the sewer connection until the use of the water pump in the old power house is discontinued. This must await the installation of two pumps at the new village wells at the city park and one of these pumps, a new one, has a necessary part missing. Until that arrives, the delay continues.

Village Treasurer Ernest Croft was granted a 30 day extension, from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15, for the collection of taxes.

Believing that membership in the Michigan Municipal League would be advantageous to Cass City, the trustees voted to join that organization.

Building permits granted include the following: Lester Evens, garage; Luther Sowder, garage; Ervin Karr, addition to building; Ray Lapp, two houses; J. V. Riley, addition to store building; Ernest Seeley, Murry DeFrais and Henry Cooklin, houses.

Sewer and water permits granted include Murry DeFrais, Ray Lapp and Fred Withey. Sewer permits to Alma Seeger and Peter DeBlois.

The street south of the school will be extended east to the recreation park.

The village clerk was requested by the village council to send out delinquent notices on water bills after Oct. 15 and "cut off" notices after Nov. 1.

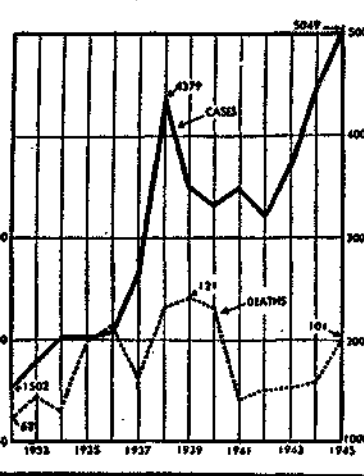

WAS FIRST PRESIDENT
OF SPARTAN WIVES

"Florence Reagh was the first president of the Spartan Wives and did much to get the organization started. She learned the basic principles of organizing as one of ten children on a Michigan farm when she drilled her younger brothers and sisters in work and play.

"Florence lives in a brick apartment for which she gives up outside amusements to pay the extra rent. The sacrifice is worth while to her because she believes her year-and-a-half-old daughter, Mollie Jo, is happier in a 'real house.' Her husband, who hopes to become a Certified Public Accountant when he has completed his studies at Michigan State, agrees with her.

"Florence found that many girls didn't like to take responsibility when the organization started, shrewdly gave them things they liked to do. Her tactics were so successful that there are now Spartan Wives in towns near the college."

Early Milk Containers

In the early days, milk was distributed from door to door in bulk by the dairy farmer. He would fill the crocks, pails or jars that the housewife left on the doorstep from the milk cans that he carried in his milk wagon. This method of distribution was used until the glass milk bottles were developed in 1879. Being transparent, the bottles clearly revealed the cream line. Being filled and capped at the plant, they were more sanitary than the bulk milk. It was not until 1906 that the paper container for milk was developed.

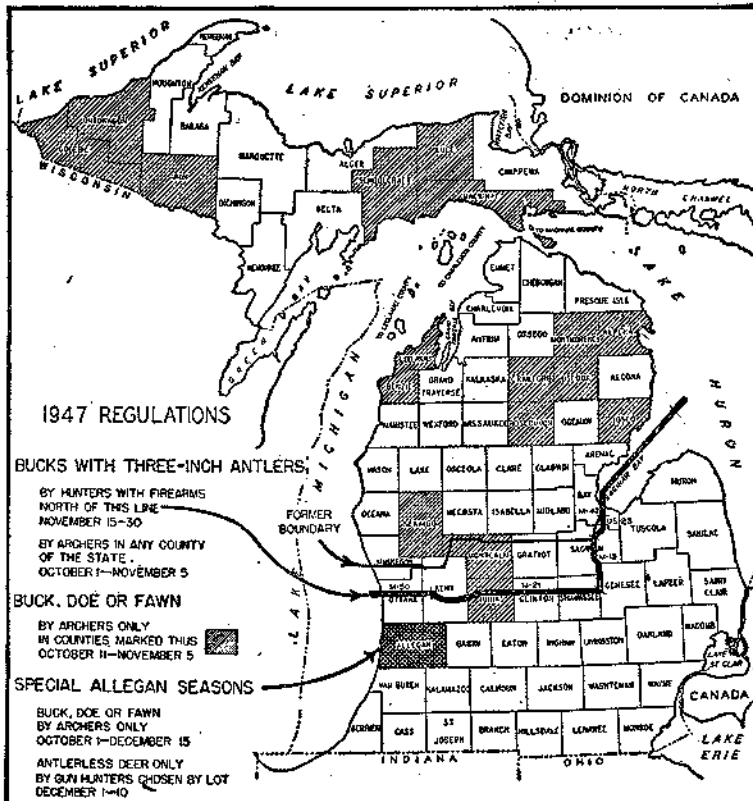
Haggis New Sausage

"One Deer" for Archers in 18 Counties



Act No. 326 of the 1947 session of the Legislature, effective October 11, permits archers to take a buck, doe or fawn October 11-November 5 this year in Alpena, Benzie, Crawford, Gogebic, Ionia, Isosco, Iron, Leelanau, Luce, Mackinac, Montcalm, Montmorency, Newaygo, Ontonagon, Oscoda, Roscommon and Schoolcraft counties. Archers have been permitted to take a buck, doe or fawn in Allegan county since 1941. October 1-November 5 archers may take bucks with three-inch antlers in any county of the state.

Southward extension of the boundary of the territory open to hunting for bucks with firearms opens an additional 3,000 square miles, including areas of crop damage by deer. The regular gun hunting season is November 15-30.

Applications for gun hunting of antlerless deer December 1-10 in part of Allegan county are accepted by the conservation department's game division at Lansing through October 5, and 300 will be chosen from among the applicants, by lot.

In most northern counties one bear per hunter may be taken during deer season, but in some counties where bear are not protected there is no closed season or bag limit. Conservation officers will advise on local bear hunting regulations.

department of agriculture. Farmers came out of the war with cash in the sock. Many of them are modernizing their homes.

Second: Michigan physicians, members of the Michigan State Medical Society, have rolled up their sleeves—to use a phrase—and are going to do something about lagging rural health. The first state rural health conference was held a few days ago at Michigan State College under the auspices of the medical society. Co-operating agencies included the Michigan State Grange and Michigan Farm Bureau.

Out of this conference came several constructive steps.

Medical scholarships will be awarded to students who will practice in rural communities for a minimum period of three to five years. Local health councils are to be established to "assist, coordinate and implement all programs contributing to the health of the people." "Medical associates" are to be recruited to assist doctors in their actual work. Medical and hospital insurance benefits will be extended to Michigan rural residents by the Michigan Medical Service's Blue Cross. The first community-wide enrollment is set for St. Johns (Clinton County) in October.

Dr. Emory W. Morris, Battle Creek, president of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation, and Dr. A. C. Furstenberg, dean of the U. of M. Medical School, recommended that rural hospitals provide office facilities for doctors, nurses, dentists and public health officials.

The above program is a harbinger of what is coming. Better health for Michigan farm folk is on the way.

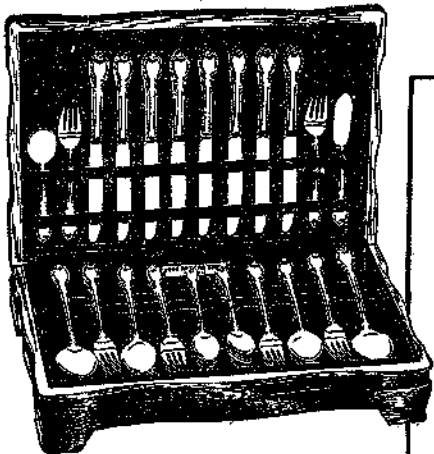
