Cass City 4-H Club Members Awarded High Prizes

Again, a group of 4-H Club members of Cass City received high awards at the Junior Livestock Show at Detroit, following the custom of several years in succession.

On Wednesday, Don Karr exhibited the grand champion of the show. This steer, an Aberdeen Angus, had previously been placed first in its class. Billy Zinnecker received third award in the Angus class.

In the Shorthorn class, Lota Little won 8th place with her steer and Jim Turner's animal stood in 9th position.

In a class of 120 Herefords, Don Loomis' steer was 2nd and Shirley Loomis' animal was 19th.

Forty groups of two steers exhibited by one club member were in competition. Billy Zinnecker won 1st and Jim Turner 3rd.

Cass City was in first place with the best three steers from one county.

Another Tuscola County boy among the winners was Carl Baur of Reese whose Angus placed 6th.

Other high award winners of the Upper Thumb included Don Poth of Brown City whose Hereford steer won the reserve grand champion prize and Margaret Leslie of Decker who won first prize in the Shorthorn steer entry. The steer of her brother, Dale, placed second in this class.

Tuscola County 4-H members led all counties in number of steers, with 38. There were 16 steers from Huron County, and 16 from Sanilac County.

A banquet for exhibitors at the Statler Hotel Wednesday night climaxed the activities of the show. Many of the prize animals were sold at auction at the show Thursday.

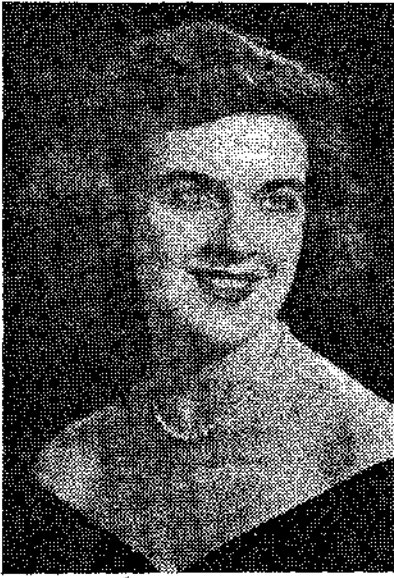

Local Lumber Firm Doubles Storage for Building Materials

New Building, 64x108 Feet, Was Erected in a Month by M. C. McLellan

Workmen are laying a cement floor for a mill work shop, 24 by 36 feet in size, at the yard of the Brinker & Armstrong Lumber Co. on East Main St. The shop is located in the new building recently erected across the alley and at the rear of the company's original building facing Main Street.

The new building, 64 by 108 feet, was built in just four weeks by M. C. McLellan, local contractor, and it will double the lumber company's storage space for their merchandise. Ten thousand cement blocks were used in the construction of the side and end walls.

A dock, truck high, occupies the southeastern part of the new building and is used for the storage of cement, while a dock on the outside will make it convenient for loading trucks. Space not occupied by the cement room and workshop will be used for storage of roofing, lumber and other building materials.

Tuscola's Average Citizen Paid 87 Cents Less per Capita for County Government than in '45

Michigan's average citizen paid 25 per cent more in 1946 than in 1945 for his county government, according to a report just released by the Michigan Survey, an association of state taxpayers.

This represents a \$3.06 gain over the 1945 average cost of \$12.36 for a \$15.42 total in 1946. The Survey release stated, By comparison Tuscola County had a per capita cost of \$14.22 for a decrease of 87 cents per capita since the previous year.

Henry Steffens, Survey director, revealed that only four of Michigan's 83 counties showed a decrease in costs. These were Lapeer, Sanilac, Tuscola and Schoolcraft counties. All the rest rose to new heights, the lowest being Genesee County with a total per capita cost of only \$9.86 and the highest Roscommon County

with a per capita cost of \$50.64. In the average county, Steffens said, "the largest single functional expenditure was for highway purposes, which accounted for 35.2 per cent of total county outlay. Next was welfare and medical assistance with another 34.7 per cent. Administration took up 23 per cent while drains and miscellaneous activities consumed the remainder."

The Survey report shows that \$2.61 was spent in Tuscola County for administrative and operating expenses. This compares with the \$3.55 average among all counties of the state.

Other Tuscola costs were: Maintenance and construction of highways, \$5.69 (state average: \$5.43); welfare and medical assistance, \$3.24 (state average: \$5.34); maintenance and construction of drains \$2.68 (state average: \$0.44).

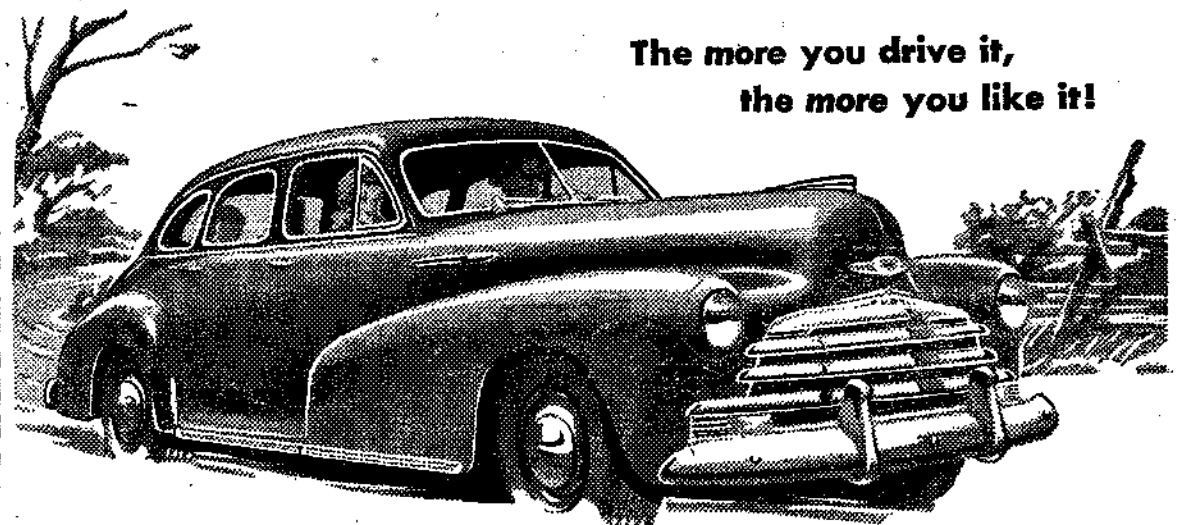

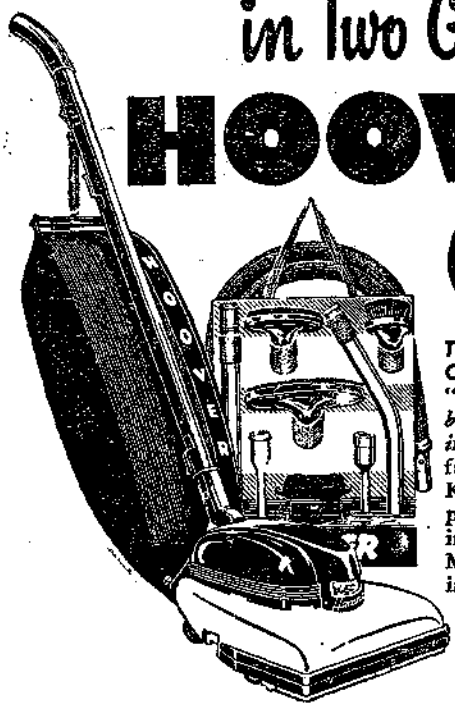

The names of the persons for whom this money is used are never divulged excepting by personal contact with the secretary and then only when it is to be used for unselfish reasons.

Many people have the idea that the infantile paralysis money is only used for the welfare or indigent cases. This is not true as it is used for any person having infantile paralysis even though they can afford to pay for the medical care themselves.

In the northwest part of Sanilac County there are no large towns and it is very difficult to get individuals to take charge of the campaign. This year the rural schools will contact the homes where children attend school. It is suggested that those people in that area who are not contacted by the school children please send their contributions to the campaign chairman, Harry C. Smith at Sandusky.

INTERPRETING THE NEWS

By Gene Alleman.

It may have come as a distinct
shock to many citizens to have the
chief executive of Michigan
publicly condemn the office of
Governor as "the crummiest job in
the United States."

On the eve of entering a hospital
for a serious operation, Kim
Sigler said just that. His words
were blunt and uncompromising.
They covered many jobs and much
territory. They were words of
condemnation, frustration and
disappointment. Sigler voiced
them before the Detroit Economic
Club, a group consisting of "big
shots" in industry and business.

Why would a governor, after
serving 11 months at the state
capital, openly denounce the office
to which most observers believe he
will be a candidate for re-election
in 1948? And what happened to
bring about this almost angry
attitude of mind?

As we see it, words of protest
are to be expected from a man who
is the creation of protest. This
colorful ex-grand jury prosecutor,
unsuccessful once in a bid to be
State Senator, rode to the office of
Governor on a popular tidal wave.

It was the voters' protest against
an assumed state of graft and cor-
ruption, wrongdoing and neglect
of office, inefficiency and laxness—
well, stretch your own imagination
at what SOME people may have
thought after reading headlines
about bribe-taking at Lansing—
that put Sigler in the governor's
chair. A similar reform move-
ment in Detroit put Homer Fergu-
son in the United States Senate.

Sigler was elected on an assump-
tion he would clean up Lansing.
Hence he was committed in ad-
vance to reform of state govern-
ment. Sigler likes action. He
would rather fly his airplane, talk
before luncheon and dinner groups
of people and spouse ideas for
better government than stay at his
office, saw wood and follow
through on countless details of ad-
ministration. He is restless and
impatient. He exhibits his dis-
pleasure by firing people. He
removed Oscar Olander as com-
missioner of state police; he dis-
charged William Burke as head of
the state prison industries.

(For reasons of "gross neglect
of duty" or "corrupt conduct in
office," a governor has constitu-
tional authority to remove "any
public officer, elective or ap-
pointive." There is one if: "Ex-
cept at such times as the legisla-
ture may be in session.")

Sigler urges a constitutional
convention as the best way to
reform state government. He puts
much emphasis on our "antiquated
tax structure," the result of a
"horse-and-buggy" constitution.
How this tax structure should be
changed he has not indicated.
There is certain to be organized
resistance to any constitutional
convention if for only one reason:
The "uniform rule of taxation" of
the 1908 constitution is a legal
barrier to a graduated state income
tax.

Sigler would centralize power in
a governor's four-year term by
giving him broad authority over
state highways, public schools, law
enforcement, motor vehicle licens-
ing, conservation and agriculture—
to mention a few. What might
happen if a "weak" governor were
to be elected, one who was subser-
vient to a party boss, is open to
interesting speculation.

Pledged to clean up state govern-
ment, Sigler now implies that he
needs new powers. Because he
lacks authority over state offices
and departments, Michigan's
governor is merely a "glorified
clerk" and the job is the "crum-

miest in the United States," so
goes the Sigler logic.

And there we are in mid-Dece-
mber, 1947. The proposed changes
merit careful appraisal and
thorough debate. Only by getting
both sides of a case can a jury
weigh the evidence and come to a
verdict.



The result was that everyone who wished to learn Dutch professed to be a medical student and 3,000 pupils are said to have passed through the medical school at Osaka in 24 years.

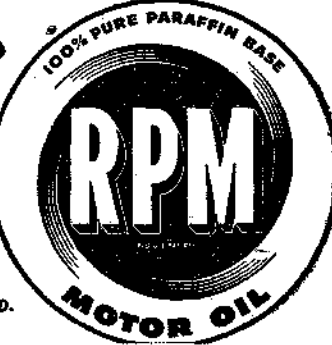

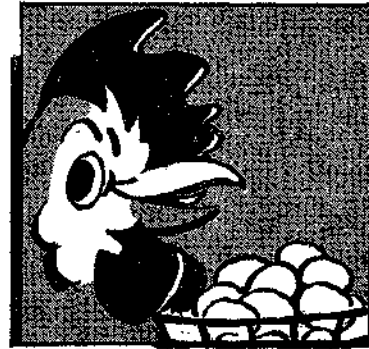

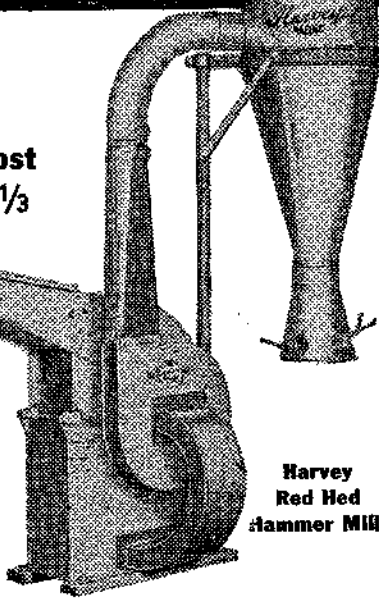

Veterans, Attention! Reinstate Your Insurance Before Dec. 31, 1947.

Any lapsed five-year level premium term National Service Life Insurance may be reinstated within the term period, within three months after lapse or on or before midnight, December 31, 1947, whichever is later, by a Comparative Health Statement. This Comparative Health Statement is submitted as evidence to verify that the applicant is in as good health on the date of application for reinstatement and tender of premium as he was on the due date of the first insurance premium in default. All applications for reinstatement after expiration of period covered by Comparative Health Statement must be accompanied by a report of physical examination showing evidence of insurability.

The National Service Life Insurance Act of 1940 originally provided for the payment of the proceeds of this insurance under one of two options to a restricted class of beneficiaries. The Insurance Act of 1946, approved August 1, 1946, liberalized the provisions of this insurance and authorized among other new features the following:

1. Removal of all beneficiary restrictions permitting the insured a free choice in naming his beneficiary or beneficiaries.
2. Right of insured to select one or more of four options for settlement, including payment in one sum.
3. Provided for the inclusion of a total disability income provision, upon application, proof of good health, and payment of extra premium.
4. The addition of three permanent plans—20 year Endowment, Endowment at Age 60 and Endowment at Age 65.
5. The right of former members of the armed forces to apply for new insurance after discharge, provided they had active service between October 8, 1940, and September 2, 1945, both dates inclusive.
