The great northern pike is an elongated slender type of fish with a color of bluish and greenish gray with more or less purplish luster on the back and sides; yellowish below and white on belly; sides with irregular rows of small round yellowish and gold spots. The top of the head is dark olive green; mouth slender and large. One of the most consistent marks for identification of this species is that the entire cheek is scaled while only the upper half of the opercle is scaled and the lower part is bare.
