A few years back E. W. Kercher became interested in a parcel of land one mile and one-half southeast of Cass City. At the time most people thought of the land as pasture. The 160 acres was typical of some 28,000 acres of light lands in Tuscola County. It had been abandoned as crop land several years ago and was now growing up to brambles, brush and ferns. The area held little attraction for farmers in the community accustomed to good yields of beans, beets, and barley, but not Kercher.

In the spring of 1943 he planted some 2,000 red and jack pine seedlings. During the year the Tuscola Soil Conservation District was organized and Mr. Kercher went to the directors with a request for technical assistance in planning his reforestation program. directors then had Dean Gordon, conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service, work out a plan with Mr. Kercher.

They agreed in the plan to use transplant trees in place of seedlings in order to secure greater survival and quicker growth. planned for mixed plantings of Scotch pine, red pine and white pine. The Scotch and part of the red pine were to be cut for Christmas trees and the remainder left to produce timber. The first planting under the plan was made in the spring of 1944 and is now beginning the first harvest of Christmas trees from that planting. The trees being cut are from four to six feet tall. Gordon estimates that from 250 to 300 trees can be cut from the planting this year. Mr. Kercher now has about 10,000 trees in his eight-acre planting.

The Soil Conservation District has distributed 220 thousand trees to farmers in the county during the past four years. One hundred and twenty thousand were planted last spring.

Gold in The Forests

Georgia farmers marketed more than 13 million dollars worth of forest products in 1946, according to reports compiled by the state extension service. More than 60,000 farmers were contacted by the state's various county agents during the year in a forest fire control program, the report continues, and 13,-000 Four-H club members carried out forestry projects. Georgia farmers also planted more than eight million seedlings during the year.

How Many Trees?

No one knows, because new ones are being discovered in remote tropical regions constantly, just how many different species of trees there are in the world. However, over 20,000, with a definite economic value, have been reported.

Jellies Make Charming Christmas Presents!

Fruit Favorites

Did you ever think of giving prizewinning jellies or home preserved things for presents? They are one of the most pleasant gifts to receive as well as to give, and with their variety of colors you can make a sparkling array of them very appropriate for holiday giving.

It's true that the jelly season is past, and few fresh berries are avail-

able, but then many homemakers have put up juice to be made into jelly. For those of you who don't have those resources, try a canned or bottled

juice like grape, and make use

the citrus fruits. If you want to do something particularly nice, make a few batches of chutney and put them up in small iars. They'll be a welcome addition to anyone's meat course, now that supplies of that food are low and we are trying to use the economical cuts for budget purposes.

Grape Jelly. (From bottled juice)

3 cups sugar 2 cups bottled grape juice 1/4 8-ounce bottle liquid pectin

Measure sugar and juice into a large saucepan and mix. If you use an unsweetened juice, add 1/2 cup of sugar. Bring to a boil over high heat and add liquid pectin at once, stirring constantly. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard for 30 seconds. Remove from heat and skim. Pour into hot sterile jelly glasses and cover with paraffin at once. Makes about five 6-ounce glasses.

Grape and Mint Jelly.

- 1/2 cup cold water 3 cans bettled grape inice ¼ cup lemon juice
- 1 3-ounce package of powdered fruit pectin
- 4 cups granulated sugar

Combine water, grape and lemon

1/2 bottle fruit pectin To prepare fruit, use skins from 6 medium oranges and 2 medium lemons and cut in quarters. Lay quarters flat; shave off and discard about half of the white part. Put yellow rinds through food chopper twice. Add 21/2 cups water, juice of 2 lemons, 1/8 teaspoon soda and 1 cup sugar. (This I cup of sugar is in addition to the 5 cups mentioned above.) Bring to a boil and simmer, covered, for 30 minutes, sitrring occasionally.

Big Four Delegates Fear Failure; Republicans Plan Larger Tax Cut; Fertilizer Exports Held in Reason

DULLES' VISIT:

To France

John Foster Dulles, Secretary of State George Marshall's advisor at the deadlocked Big Four conference, thought the state of events occurring in France was of greater significance than the negotiations of the foreign ministers' council in London. So the U. S. brain-truster turned his back on England and paid a visit to Paris — with secretary Marshall's permission — to find out, if he could, the relation between Premier Robert Schuman's government and Gen. Charles DeGaulle's pow-

erful right-wing party.
Whatever Dulles learned about that particular situation he was not publicizing it. But, after conferring with Schuman, Pres. Vincent Auriol, Finance Minister Rene Meyer and others, he made some highly quot able statements.

. France's resistance to communism is more significant than that of any other country in Europe, he said, adding that he felt that no fatal blow has yet been struck there to the Marshall plan.

"After my conferences," said Dulles, "I desire to express my admiration for the way in which the French have drawn together to bury their differences in order to come to the defense of the French state." The strikes and disorders taking place in France, he pointed out cheerfully, would have the effect of hastening the vote in congress of American aid. It would help to convince his Republican colleagues of

the urgency of the need. Concerning the London conference, Dulles was not so optimistic: "I still hope that the foreign ministers' conference will become



Paris with French Premier Robert Schuman and Jefferson Caffery, U. S. ambassador to

more realistic, but so far what has been done has not been very important in comparison with what has been happing here (in France.)"

Meanwhile, by the time the tour-ing Dulles had returned to London American officials, including Secretary Marshall, virtually had reconciled themselves that the Big Four parley was a total failure insofar any tangible results were concerned.

It appeared as though the three western powers had split irretrievably with Russia over how to negotiate German and Austrian peace

Russia's Molotov simply had refused to go along. While Marshall, Bevin and Bidault had tried doggedly to bring the discussions around to basic issues, Molotov had continued his evasive tactics. Virtually every word he said was designed for consumption by the German people - to convince them that Russia and only Russia had their best interests at heart. Nothing he said led one step toward a clarification of the problems at hand.

About the only thing that France, Great Britain and the U.S. knew was that Russia was insisting on 10 billion dollars in reparations from Germany. They knew, too, that 10 billion was too much; but they were not abandoning all hope that Molotov might whittle down that amount. thus enabling the conference to continue instead of ending in a stale-

FERTILIZER:

Exported

Complaints by American farmers that shipping fertilizer to Europe under the emergency relief plan will cripple home production are not justified, according to Secretary of Commerce Averell Harriman.

Only nitrogen content commercial fertilizers will be supplied to France, Italy and Austria. There will be no contributions of potash or phosphates, both Harriman and Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Ander-

While 47,000 tons of nitrogen fertilizer will be shipped abroad under the interim aid program, only 11,000

tons of that will come from this country. The rest will be bought, with American money from Chile and other producing countries and sent with U.S. compliments.

In addition to that 11,000 tons, Harriman said, the United States can be expected to ship commercially another 6,000 tons to other countries. The 17,000-ton total will be less than 3 per cent of the nation's anticipated production in 1947

That, however, does not mean that all American demands can be met, Harriman explained, because domestic demand has been rising, and theoretically the U.S. can use much more fertilizer than it has been getting.

TAXES:

Bigger Cut

Republicans in congress have raised their sights on the amount of income tax reduction they will be gunning for next year.

A high-placed party member has reported that they will launch a drive for a slash in individual income taxes of 5.3 billion dollars or more. That is 1.3 billion above the 4 billion dollars called for in two bills vetoed earlier this year.

Tax reduction probably will be tied in with whatever substitute measure the Republicans offer to replace President Truman's antiinflation program,

Although Rep. Harold Knutson



(Rep., Minn.), chairman of the house ways and means committee and chief GOP tax watchdog, would neither confirm nor deny the report that plans were on the board to raise the tax-cutting figure, it was logical to assume that the re-

port was correct. Top Republican figures and policy makers had been growing more vociferous recently in their insistence that one of the major points in any program to deflate the inflation bubble must be a reduction of taxes, coupled, of course, with less government spending.

PHOOEY:

Spinach

It looks like the youngsters have been right all along about spinach. according to the claim of Dr. Thurman B. Rice of the Indiana state board of health.

Contrary to the age-old parental cry of "Eat your spinach, Junior, it's good for you," Dr. Rice con-tends that it is "pretty close to probability" that there is danger in eating spinach, even for adults.

You could get just about as much nutritional benefit from nibbling at the front lawn as from devouring a bowl of spinach, he implied.

"If God had intended for us to eat, spinach He would have flavored it with something," said Dr. Rice, Writing in a monthly health bulletin he asserted that "Spinach contains almost no protein and what protein it has is very hard to digest. A man would starve to death very promptly on spinach. He would have to eat about 30 pounds a day to get average caloric requirement for his

SHIFT: Soil Building

In India If the events following the parti-

tioning of Palestine fall into the pattern which developed after the separation of India into Hindu and Moslem states, peace should descend upon the Holy Land in a year or so.

More than eight million refugees crossed the India-Pakistan border in both directions up to November 21, the Dominion of India press information bureau disclosed.

This greatest mass migration in history followed the severe outbreak of communal strife arising out of the bisecting of India into two dominions, India and Pakistan, along religious lines. The partition brought to a head the long-standing grievance between Moslems and Hindus and Sikhs in India.

The immensely complex problem of exchanging minority populations, which began as an uncontrolled ex-odus of terrified villagers and then was organized by the Indian and Pakistan armies, now is about over, although there still are several hundred thousand persons in refugee

Strangely, the enormity of the task before the two dominion governments appears to have brought them together at a time when they were moving farther apart. Renewed amicability in India-Pakistan relations appears likely to foster settlement of many outstanding political and financial problems facing the two nations now.

ROCKETS:

No Control


As far as army scientists are concerned it is one thing to construct and fire a rocket missile, but the problem of how to control its flight and make it land at a pre-calculated point is something else again.

New and more powerful rocket motors for guided missiles are being developed, but scientists say that the problem of guidance and control of missiles is "formidable." The Germans found during the last war that their V-2 rocket was a destructive weapon, but that its effectiveness was limited because control at best was haphazard.

"From the standpoint of present practical accomplishment, it is obvious that an enormous amount of research and development must be done in the control and guided mis-sile field," one top armed service scientist admitted.

Completely new problems emerged when the scientists started trying to guide and change the direction of missiles traveling at speeds around 3,500 miles an houralmost five times the speed of

NAVAJOS:

To the Rescue

Time brings all things-even a reversal of the stock theme of many western movies where the U.S. cavalry rides to the rescue of a besieged pioneer family and drives away the band of hostile Indians.

For now the U.S. government will be asked to come to the rescue of the Indians, specifically the Navajos living under conditions of appalling poverty in New Mexico and Arizona.

President Truman has declared he will ask congress for additional relief funds in January to prevent "starvation on the reservation." He is seeking, also, a 'long range program of rehabilitation."

A report by Julius Krug, secretary of the interior, describing the plight of the Navajo tribe said that the Indians are facing "emergency conditions which require the full aid of the federal government guarding against starvation on their reservation this winter."

Reason for the Navajo's destitution is the fact that their population has increased (600 per cent from the time the reservation was laid out) to the point where they no longer can support themselves on



The difference between soil building and soil mining is shown in the chart below. Soil building means increasing the soil's organic matter and plant food supply and maintaining high crop yields. It means feed ing the soil and letting the soil feed the crops, rather than trying to feed each individual crop.

The comparative results shown here were obtained at the Ewing ! soil experiment field in Illinois. One plot has had no soil treatment since the field was established in 1910. The other plot has had large amounts of



lime, phosphate and potash to get heavy stands of deep-rooted legumes. Corn stalks have been re turned to this plot. The rotation on both plots has been corn, oats, clo ver and wheat.

Crop yields covering a four-year rotation tell the story. Corn production on the fertilized plot was four times greater than on the untreated field; oats nearly four times and wheat about eight times great-Clover yield on the fertilized plot was 1.9 tons per acre; the untreated plot is too acid to grow

Despite the greater amounts of nitrogen and organic matter used in producing the higher yields, the fertilized plot still contains 41/2 tons more organic matter and 460 pounds more nitrogen than the untreated

Farm Hints That Pay In Better Products

The Cornell results are in line with earlier tests of vitamins for calf scours in Michigan and Ohio. Even though the use of vitamins lacks encouragement, there is prom ise in another direction—the sulfa drugs. Sulfaguanidine has been found helpful. Sulfathiazole, one of the faster acting sulfas, which has been used against dysentery in humans, also has been used successfully in calf scours treatment. In tests, a combination of sulfathiazole with kaolin and pectin was more effective than either sulfathiazole or sulfaguanidine alone.

Don't use binder twine for tying fleeces. Use paper twine instead. When binder twine is used pieces of the fiber break off and get into the wool. These fail to take color when dyed. Who loses? The sheep-

LATIN-AMERICAN GEOGRAPHY

Correct pronunciation of South American place names is important in these days of inter-American solidarity. Following are some sam-

Guiana. There are three Guianas, British, Dutch and French. The origin is doubtful. But it may have came from Guayana, an Indian tribal name. Gulana is pronounced ghee-AH-nah.

Honduras. The name is a Spanish word meaning "depth; deepness," probably a reference to the depths off shore, or to the deep, wavelike valleys. The pronunciation is: awn-DOO-rahss ("H" is never pronounced in Spanish). The capital is Tegucigalpa, pronounced: tay-GOO-see-GAHL'-pah.

Nicaragua. When this region was discovered, the Indian tribes were led by a great chief named Nicarao, hence the name. Nicaragua is pronounced: NEE-kah-RAH'gwah. The capital is Managua, pronounced: mah-NAH-gwah.

Panama is said to be an Indian word meaning, "place of many fishes." The native pronunciation is: pah-nah-MAH.

Paraguay. The name probably is from the Guarani word paraguay, meaning "a place of a great river roaring like the sea." The pronunciation is: pah-rah-GWY. The capital is Asuncion, "elevation," pronounced; ah-soon-SYOEN.

Peru, too, is of uncertain origin; but it may have come from the prehistoric tribal name Priuas. Peru is pronounced: pay-ROO. The capital is Lima, pronounced: LEE-mah. Salvader means "saviour; redeemer." The name is pronounced: sahl-vah-DAWR, or, occasionally:

sahl-vah-THAWR. The capital is San Salvador. Uruguay is a name of unknown origin. The pronunciation is: oo-roo-GWY. The capital is Montevideo, pronounced: MOEN-tay-vee-DAY'-

Venezuela means "little Venice." The name is pronounced: VAY-nay-SWAY'lah. The capital is Caracas. pronounced: kah-RAH-kahss.



Medicated Poultry Mash is Effective **Government Trials Show** Remedy Deworms Flock

Use of a medicated mash containing nicotine - phenothiazine has proved effective in deworming poultry, it was shown in trials conducted by the department of agriculture.

In the government trials, two kinds of worms (cecal and round) were checked and kept at a low level by using a medicated mash containing nicotine, bentonite (a clay-

like substance) and phenothiazine in ordinary poultry mash. Says the government report:

'Under experimental conditions the treatment expelled approximately 99 per cent of the two kinds of worms. Under field conditions, the feeding of this medicated mash to chickens for three consecutive days, at intervals of three weeks, maintained a low level of parasitism in the treated birds.

"Fifteen grams of 40 per cent nicotine sulfate solution were com-bined with 151 grams of phenothiazine and 287 grams of nicotine bentonite in 44 pounds of ordinary chick mash.'

This combination of nicotine, bentonite and phenothiazine has been found effective in research carried on by private organizations, and there are products on the market of essentially the same composition as that used by the agriculture department.

New Method Devised For Treating Posts

A new method of treating fence posts and freshly sawed green lumber has been originated at the Lake States forest experiment station. This procedure, the "dry salting" method, consists of applying a mixture of copper sulphate and sodium dichromate in powder form to the surface of freshly peeled green posts and freshly sawed green lum-

The mixture of these chemicals dissolves in a humid atmosphere and clings to the surface of moist posts and lumber when applied as

The method results in deep penetration of the preservative which appears to be firmly fixed in the wood so that it is not readily leached out. A definite advantage of this process over any other now available is that treatment can be concentrated at the ground line and top where more protection against decay is needed. The resulting posts have an attractive blue color which is not readily leached out, and tests indicate that the preservative is relatively noncorrosive to staples and wire.

Small Amount of Salt Needed by All Pigs

After several years of tests, the Missouri experiment station has found that hogs having free access to salt consume an average of only a fraction of an ounce per head daily. However, this small amount of salt caused these hogs to make much faster gains than hogs fed a similar ration without salt. The tests indicated that the best way to feed the salt is free choice in mineral



KNOW YOUR BREED British Percheron By W. J. DRYDEN

The British Percheron, like the American Percheron, originally was imported from the La Perche province near Normandy. France.

First used extensively during World War I, the demand for this type of draft horse was so great

that by 1918 the British Percheron Horse society had been formed to encourage the breeding of Percherons for agricultural work.

The color of the British Percheron is gray or black with little white. Stallions are a minimum of 16 hands, 3 inches tall, with mares allowed 2 inches shorter.

Keep Them Healthy

To reduce lamb and sheep losses from dogs and wolves, use truck flares placed in holders on top of steel posts driven into the ground. Sheep learn to gather near the flares at night. Wolves and dogs are kept away by the flicker of the fiame and the odor.

If DDT fails to control flies around the barn, it's probably because there are manure piles or old strawstack bottoms nearby. These breeding places can turn out flies faster than DDT can kill them,

Blackhead of turkeys is caused by an organism that is carried by cecal worms. Phenothiazine is effective in removing these worms from chickens and turkeys. Many turkey raisers now give phenothiazine in the mash every three or four weeks to prevent outbreaks of black-

Farms Use Six Times As Many Tires as City

The typical Midwestern American farm has six times as many rubber tires on its rolling stock as a onecar city-dwelling family, a survey conducted by B. F. Goodrich company indicates. The survey covered 105 farms in a representative "agricultural" county in Illinois. and disclosed an average of 32 pneumatic rubber tires per farm. From the standpoint of actual rubber volume the farmer's edge is greater.

Dewey Decimal System

Dewey decimal system is the classification of books as used in libraries of the country. The system was originated by Melvil Dewey, founder of New York state school libraries and founder and editor of the Library Journal in 1876. He published his decimal classification and relative index from 1876 to 1929.

In Wales, it was customary for the Hodening Horse to recite long extemporaneous verses: if the Horse outwitted his bost, he was invited in for cakes and cider. A less witty procedure was followed in some rural communities and along lonely roads: wealthy citizens and travelers were attacked by unknown Hodening Horses who demanded 'fines' from their victims.

Open Air "Festas" Vs. Santa Claus

Santa Claus has firmly entrenched himself in the hearts of Brazilian youngsters, although his traditional chimney had to be abandoned—very few homes being equipped with such things, and it never occurs to the small fry that it might be fun to spy on Santa; the children beg to stay up, of course, hoping to participate in the grown-up festivities and perhaps accompany their parents to midnight mass.
