Walbro Corporation this week first dividend payment in the history of the company as officials authorized 50 cents a share to shareholders of record Dec. 1. The checks were moiled today

The dividend payment came a little over five years after the company began operations in Cass City. Since that time Walbro

has experienced a rapid growth. Besides establishing a wholly owned subsidiary in Omro. Wis., to handle increasing carburetor orders and more than doubling the size of manufacturing space for carburetors in Cass City, the company purchased Autopulse

electric fuel pump company. The Autopulse division of the company required another building, erected by the Cass City Corporation, on Development Walbro property for manufacture of pumps and fuel lifters.

Most recent addition to the company is the Arjay Manufac-turing Company of Vassar, a plastics manufacturing plant.

Bake in a very moderate oven, 300°, for 21/4 hours. Decorate the top with maraschino cherries and the sliced Brazil nuts.







Mechanical Breadwinner for Game



One of the Conservation Department's latest habitat-improvement tools for game—a D-7 tractor equipped with an 11-foot cutting blade—will begin thrusting its way through snow, brush and timber in food-shortage areas of northern Michigan this month. The 20-ton machine will again be tested on non-mer-chantable stands of aspen to furnish browse for deer, stimulate sprout regeneration for their post-winter food supply, and provide cover and vegetation for small game. Under normal win-ter conditions, the crawler-type tractor levels two to three acres per hour. Department game men report the machine's test cuttings last winter were successful.
