NAMED THEIR CANDIDATES.

At the Republican Township Caucus Held Tuesday Afternoon.

A harmonious gathering of Elkland township Republicans assembled in the town hall Tuesday afternoon and placed the following ticket in nomination:

Justice of the Peace--E. B. Landon.
School Inspector (to fill vacancy)--John Gallagher.
School Inspector (full term)--Nolton Bigelow.

Member of the Board of Review--John Spurgeon, Jr.
Constables--C. D. Striffler, Henry Ball, J. D. Tuckey and John Wooley.

The above ticket is a strong one and appeals to every voter in the township. Without a doubt it will be elected as Elkland has polled Republican majorities for some years past, and this year it is expected that it will not fail to add to the majority it received in 1904.

Mr. McKenzie, who leads the ticket, is well and favorably known to the people of the township, and has made an excellent record as supervisor. He is public spirited and is in a position to give his undivided attention to the affairs of the township.

All the nominations in the caucus except those for highway commissioner and justice of the peace were made by acclamation.

A. A. McKenzie was re-elected a member of the Republican township committee.

NEAR-BY NOTES.

Arnot & Mark of Deckerville have established a bank at Urban with R. J. Arnot as cashier.

A thrilling revival has been conducted at Yale with the result that over ninety converts have begun a better life.

Jas. H. Hallock of Imlay City last week purchased the Imlay City Times of Frank L. Gates, who has owned and published the paper for just one year.

Lyman Hines, a 14-year-old boy of Vassar, was sent to the Industrial School at Lansing last week after confessing to have stolen money from the store till of the firm of Brett & Beach.

Jacob Beck, a prominent resident of Sebawaing, died Monday morning from paralysis aged 69. He had lived there since 1863 and was the founder of the grape-growing industry in Huron county.

Remalt & Son's sawmill in Decker-ville was destroyed by fire Thursday night and it is thought that the fire was of incendiary origin. The loss is about \$4,000. Two years ago another mill on the same site was burned.

William Drennan, a Michigan volunteer in Co. M, Thirty-third regiment, U. S. A., died at his home at Yale Sunday, aged 20 years. Drennan enlisted in Detroit at the beginning of the Spanish war and contracted yellow fever in the Philippines, from the results of which he never recovered.

Smoke belching from nearly every window in the second story of Elijah Brown's house at Sanilac Centre, drove firemen back repeatedly in their attempt to locate the blaze, until eventually three men risked themselves in a bed room with rags stuffed in their mouths and located the fire, which was burning fiercely on the under side of a feather bed.

The Free Press says that a case of the inhuman brutality on the part of a husband toward his wife was brought to light Tuesday by the arrest of John Auerhammer, a German farmer living four miles from Vassar. After filling up on bad whisky until he was unable to consume more, he left for his home. Mrs. Auerhammer is in a delicate condition, and after entering the house, Auerhammer deliberately kicked his wife in the stomach. It is alleged, before his numerous children, and otherwise mistreated and pounded her. Officers arrested the man and took him to Caro where he was arraigned and pleaded guilty. He was fined \$100 with the alternative of spending ninety days in the Detroit house of correction. Auerhammer was arrested once before for wife beating, it is alleged, but friends came to his rescue and secured his release.

With the passing of Michael Brenner, a Russian Jew, whose body was taken from Harbor Beach to Bay City Tuesday for burial, that place lost a citizen whose greatest desire for a longer lease of life was that he might be allowed to live to assist his wife

and five sons to celebrate the downfall of the Russian government as a result of its war with Japan, says the Detroit Tribune. Mr. Brenner was born within sight of the royal palace in St. Petersburg, 55 years ago, where he resided until 40 years old, or until 15 years ago, when the czar issued an order compelling a large number of the Jewish people to suddenly seek a more congenial clime. Brenner left an estate in St. Petersburg valued at \$5,000, which he had accumulated by many years of hard work, commencing by selling upon the streets of his native city the first matches ever put on the market in the Russian capital. The estate was confiscated by the government. When Brenner arrived in New York he was almost destitute. He was personally acquainted with Gen. Kuropatkin.

The Cass City school scored another brilliant success last Friday evening, when the play, "The Deacon," was presented to a large audience at the opera house by the pupils of the school. "Pete," the darkey, as played by Stanley Graham, won for him a warm place in the hearts of those who are partial to minstrelsy. "Daisy," servant of Mrs. Thornton, was splendidly characterized by Miss Anna Adair, and her many encounters with Pete furnished lots of amusement. Roy McKenzie played a double part, "Pedro, the organ grinder," and "Parson Brownlow."

Of course a play wouldn't be complete without a villain and his accomplices, and Roy Houghton, as "George Darrah," assisted by Dan Duncanson as "James Reed," were the "desperit" characters. Roy's make-up and acting were exceptionally good and Dan was a good second. "George Graef," the man against whom the "villains" plotted was ably taken by Irwin Bradford. "Mrs. Darrah," the wronged wife of George Darrah, by Miss Mamie Brooker and her daughter, "Nellie," by Marie Brooker, were very good. The street scene where little Marie took a prominent part was very touching. The play was one of the best ever seen here.

Music for the evening was furnished by the Cass City orchestra, and Miss Ora McKim also gave several piano solos.

The receipts of the evening were \$150.10 and the proceeds will be used for a payment on the piano used in the high school and for the high school base ball team's expenses.

Monthly statements will be issued giving amount of account and amount due, and all will be treated with uniform courtesy.

Accounts standing at present will share in this arrangement, and unless there has been some positive arrangement to the contrary, items sold previous to February 1st will be due April 1st, and must be settled in cash or bankable notes.
