BRIEF ITEMS ABOUT MICHIGAN PEOPLE AND THINGS.

Fine Masonic Temple Dedicated at Grand Rapids .-- I. O. O. F. Grand Lodge and Daughters of Rebekah Convention at Saginaw.-Brief Mention.

Grand Rapids Masons Dedicate a Temple With a fine autumn day, a large

number of visitors and the city most gorgeously decorated the Masons of Grand Rapids were very happy on the day of the dedication of their new seven-story temple. There were Masons from all parts of the state, but of course the star attraction of the big parade was the champion Detroit Commandery Knights Templar, which occupied the position of honor in the parade, which was one of the finest ever witnessed in that city. The ob-jective point of the parade was the Masonic temple. The ceremonies of the day were performed in the magnificent blue lodge room, and were con-ducted by Grand Master E. L. The exercises closed with brief addresses by Grand Master Bowring, Deputy Grand Master J. J. Carson, Grand Secretary J. S. Conover, Grand Warden Lou B. Winsor and Past Grand Commanders Judge John W. McGrath, Judge John W. Champlin, Judge George H. Durand, Hon. Hugh Mc-Curdy, A. M. Clark and others. The reception in the evening was a

brilliant social function and the attendance reached several thousands. The Masonic temple was elaborately illuminated, both within and without. Music was discoursed during the evening by the Grand Rapids and Fourth Regiment bands, and in the banquet The halls refreshments were served. reception was not confined to the fraternity alone, but many prominent invited guests were present.

Michigan Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. The fifty-first grand lodge of the I. O. O. F. and the twelfth state convention of Daughters of Rebekah was held at Lansing. There were 600 delegates to the grand lodge, and 300 to the con-vention. Gov. Rich made an address of welcome to a joint meeting of the two bodies and after responses by Grand Master Salter and President Wiselogel, of the convention, the two bodies separated for the transaction of their business. Grand Master Salter's annual address was very lengthy and showed a prosperous year for the order. it being numerically stronger in Michigan than at any other period in its history. REPORTS FROM VARIOUS W. C. T. U. LEADERS.

> How the Work of Improvement Is Speeding in the Land-A Power Has Arisen to Spread the Banner fo Purity.

At the third day's meeting of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of America at Baltimore, Sunday, the following reports were read: Mary D. Tomlinson, who read the report on "Parlor Meetings," said: "The hand that rocks the cradle rules the world," and an ancient Roman orator bestowed a flattering compliment upon the homes of Roman mothers when he said: "The empire is at the fireside." Thirteen

hundred and forty-two parlor meetings have been held; 1,400 members and 308 honoraries were gained. Fifteen hundred and sixteen dollars were raised at these social meetings.

The report of the purity department showed that much good work had been done in the last legislative year.

The report on purity in literature and art shows that nothing may enter that defileth or maketh ashamed. The report finishes with the statement: "We scrutinize the literature on newsstands and have secured the co-operation of the American News company; also of superintendents of railroads, steamboats, libraries, mail matter, bill posters, shows, exhibitions and art galleries. We have sent out petitions and letters throughout the entire United States for an elevated press, indorsed by the National Editorial Association of the United States by strong resolutions. Also by state associations; notably New York state association. With the support of the present president of the National Editorial association in the work for a pure press. Bill posters have been cleaned, and many states have passed laws for the legal power of this department. Others have worked for laws and created a strong public sentiment for purity."

Fortunately, in most parts of the country the drouth did not set in until after the principal crops were matured, consequently the effect has not been disastrous. In some places it has had a slight effect on the planting of winter wheat, and complaints come from many quarters of the inconvenience of securing water for domestic

Mysterious Murder of a Child. Much excitement has been occasioned

Michigan Banks in Fine Condition.

Banking Commissioner Sherwood has issued a statement showing the condition of the 167 state banks and three trust companies of Michigan. The total resources and liabilities are \$85,173,920.09. The item of loans and discounts, stocks. bonds and mortgages, which indicate the extent of the banks' transactions, shows an increase of \$2,763,323.15, thus demonstrating that increased business is demanding more money. Since July 11 the total deposits show an increase of \$3,136,203.47; commercial deposits an increase of \$1,405,718.98; certificates of deposits an increase of \$649,274.68; and savings deposits an increase of \$1,081,-994.07.
