# MICHIGAN NEWS SUMMARY.

Doings of the Week Recorded in a Brief Style. CONCISE AND INTERESTING.

Live Stock Breeders in Convention-Out Election Contest at Saginaw-Detroit Exposition Plans Progressing.

Michigan Live Stock Breeders. Various organizations of Michigan stock breeders met at Lansing simultaneously and discussed papers bearing upon the merits of different kinds of live stock. The Short Horn Cattle breeders elected D. F. Bacheler, of Howell, president, and I. H. Butterfield, of Agricultural College, secretary.

The Merino Sheep breeders elected: President, D. P. Dewey, Grand Blanc; secretary, E. N. Ball, Hamburg; treasarer, Thomas VanGeisen, Clinton,

The Swine Breeders' association chose as president, E. A. Bush, Fowlerville; secretary and treasurer. George H. McIntvre. Iosco.

The State Association of Breeders of Improved Live Stock named H. H. Hinds, of Stanton, president; Robert Gibbons, of Detroit, secretary. National Association of Breeders of

Lincoln Sheep: President, J. J. England, of Caro; secretary and treasurer, H. A. Daniels, of Elva.

The State Holstein Breeders' association elected C. D. Seeley, of Pontiac, president, and C. L. Seeley, of Lansing, secretary.

Michigan's Salt Industry.

The total amount of salt manufactured in Michigan during 1898 was 4,477,121 barrels, or 854,357 more barrels than in 1897. The amount of salt inspected during 1898, was as follows: Manistee county, 1,555,006; St. Clair county, 596,547; Mason county, 557,838; Wayne county, 546,093; Saginaw county, 424,044; Bay county, 402,231; Iosco county, 58,358; Midland county, 31,799; total, 4,171,916.

The state salt inspector reports: Balance of cash on hand Dec. 1, 1897, \$1,-815.03; duties on 4,171,916 barrels at 3 mills per barrel, \$12,515.72; total \$14,-330.78. The expenditures were \$10,-850.72; balance on hand Dec. 1, 1898, \$3,480.06. The number of persons employed in the manufacture of salt in the state is 2,184.

Of the 4,171,916 barrels of salt inspected in this state in 1898, at least 75 per cent was sold in other states, and the demand for Michigan salt is steadily increasing.

1898 Losses on the Lakes. Marine losses during the season of 1898 were materially greater than during any previous season on the lakes. In a list of 569 losses, the causes assigned were as follows: Ashore, 123; aground, in protected channels, 126; Niles. fire 40; collisions, 90; ice, 16; stormbeaten, 96; foundered, 8; miscellaneous causes, 116. /Lake Michigan was the scene of the greatest number of serious losses, with Lake Superior as second. Lake Huron was remarkably free from disasters and Lake Erie did not contribute its usual quota. Lake Ontario produced a larger number of serious losses than Lake Eric, notwithstanding the limited traffic on the former. 'The number of boats which have passed entirely out of existence is 58. Their aggregate tonnage was 29,194 tons. The money loss is about \$3,-000.000.

Sick Soldier Sulcides. Walter B. Foster, of Flint, committed suicide at St. Ignace by taking strychnine. He leaves a mother, his only relative. Foster was about 30 years of age. He enlisted at Island Lake last April with Co. A, 33d Michigan, and served with credit in Cuba. He caught yellow fever at Siboney and came home on the death ship Concho. While at home he recovered his health, Salt Industry Growing - Interesting apparently, but latter became sick again and being unable to obtain remunerative employment drifted from place to place and finally lost hope and ended all with poison. His mother is

left in proverty. 31st Michigan to be Mustered Out. The decision of President McKinley's cabinet to muster out 50.000 volunteers will probably result in the discharge

of all the members of the 31st Michigan, now at Knoxville, Tenn., that may desire to leave the service. Those who wish to remain will be permitted join the 35th Michigan, unless it is decided to muster out that regiment, also. It is not believed, however, that both regiments will be let go until congress to die. authorizes the increase in the regular army asked for by Secretary Alger.

Pardons for Five Convicts. Gov. Pingree granted five Christmas pardons, as follows: Wm. Nuremberg, sent from Oakland county in May, 1895, for 10 years, for rape. James Powers, from Flint in May, 1898, one year, highway robbery. Alex. R. Currie, from Detroit in January, 1897, five years, manslaughter. Louis Smith, from Adrian in Feb. 1898, two years

and six months, burglary. William Macard, from Grand Rapids in May, 1895, to Marquette prison, 15 years, perjury.

Disastrous Fire at Manistee. Fire was discovered in the East Shore furniture factory at Manistee and before the flames could be checked the building was totally destroyed, together with its contents. The loss is estimated at \$20,000, and covered by insurance. The property was originally built at a cost of \$50,000, but had been idle for some time on account of the depression in the furniture trade.

Col. Irish Wants to Succeed Burrows. Edwin M. Irish, of Kalamazoo, recently adjutant-general of the Michigan National Guard, and now colonel of the 35th Michigan volunteers, and serving with his regiment at Augusta, Ga., has entered the race as an active candidate for the United States senate to succeed Julius Caesar Burrows.

Niles is to have a new independent telephone company. Chas. II Ross, of Pontiac, was killed by a train at Inwood, Ind.

Chas. Jamison is the new postmaster at Slights, Grand Traverse county. An unknown man, aged about 60, was killed by a Big Four train near

Arthur Smith, a farmer, fell off a load of hay near Brighton and was fatally injured.

John A. Severens, superintendent of D. M. Ferry & Co.'s big seed establishment, at Detroit, with which he had been connected for 19 years, committed suicide by shooting. He had a halucination that he was going insane. It is now reported that the \$6,000 which Wm. Schaal, cf Imlay City, claimed was burned by himself and wife when they decided to die together, is hid in a barrel. Schaal is serving 12

years in prison for assisting his wife F. K. Stearns, of Detroit, has presented to the U. of M., a valuable collection of musical scores, which forms an admirable supplement to the unique exhibit of musical instruments recent ly presented by his father, Frederick Stearns.

Byron Parrish, aged 19, pleaded guilty at Ithaca to the cruel murder near Wheeler of Delbert Lloyd, aged 14, for the purpose of robbing him of his bicycle and a small sum of money. His sentence was 25 years in Jackson state prison.

A big bear tackled E. Weinberg and Luther McKenzie on the road near Turner. The former ran for a farm house to get a gun and the bear and pulled out a big jackknife and ripped

Mr. Bear open. Fred E. Brittan, state chairman of the Prohibition party, claims that that political organization made a gain of election over that of 1896. The next state convention will be held at Jackson on Feb. 28.

The state board of canvassers have issued certificates of election to Eli R. Sutton and J. Byron Judkins as regents of the U. of M., but as there is a vacancies the supreme court must pass upon the matter.

Michigan school children lead in the contribution of funds toward the erection in Paris of a monument to the memory of Gen. Lafayette. They have contributed \$3,196. It is the intention to raise \$50,000. The monument will be unveiled July 4, 1900.

The state railroad crossings board has disapproved the map of the proprosed extension of the Wisconsin & Michigan railroad through the counties of Iron and Dickinson to certain iron mines in that section. The route is declared to be a dangerous one.

# News of the Day as Told Over the Slender Wires.

DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN NEWS The Increasing of the Standing Army is Opposed by Part of the House Committee on Military Affairs-Clayton-

Bulwer Treaty Will be Abrogated.

Oppose a Large Army. The minority of the house commitee on military affairs have filed their report in opposition to the Hull bill for the increase of the regular army to 00,000 men.

The minority claims that such a standing army would in time of peace be a menace to the liberty of citizens, and in time of war would not be sufficient to meet successfully the armies of the first class powers of the world; that a large standing army is not a necessity; that the Hull bill will cost the people annually the sum of \$150,-000,000 and as \$145,000,000 are being annually paid to the soldiers of the civil war and the war with Spain, a permanent charge of \$295,000,000 would be placed upon the people of the United States to maintain the military establishment alone, to say nothing of the navy; that the passage of this bill means the practical destruction of the national guard and the volunteer

troops of the states: that it is well understood that the great corporate interests of the country are demanding this large standing army for most obvious reasons, and a President dominated by such interests would have, with such a standing army, the means McKenzie were in a mix-up when Mac at his hand to invade the liberties of the people, to suppress freedom of speech and to desecrate the ballot box itself.

The minority offer a substitute for the Hull bill which provides for a permanent standing army of 30,000 en-71 per cent in Michigan in the last listed men-about the number in the army before the war with Spain. It also provides for 50,000 volunteers to be taken from the states and territories

in proportion to population; these volunteers are to be mustered out within two years from date of the passage of the act, their organization to be the difference of opinion as to there being same as that of the regular army. Volunteer organizations now in service to be given preference as to re-enlistment. All volunteers now in the ser-

vice of the United States to be mustered out within 60 days from the passage of this act

To Abrogate the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty It is accepted as little short of certain in the best informed official and liplomatic eircles at Washington that negotiations will be opened at an early day toward so modifying the Clayton-Bulwer treaty as to meet the conditions of the present day concerning American construction and control of the Nicaraguan canal.

London: There seems to be little doubt that Great Britain will agree to abrogate the Clayton-Eulwer treaty.

## CONGRESS AT WORK AGAIN.

Senator Teller (Rep., Col.) made a lengthy speech in advocacy of the theory that there are no restrictions upon the right of the United States to expand its borders so as to include far distant territory. He went quite thoroughly into the legal points bearing upon the question and also incidentally discussed at some length the form of government for the Filipinos, saying that he would encourage selfgovernment among the islanders and would give them the most liberal government which they were capable of conducting. but that he would not take down the American flag where once planted.

Rep. Williams (Dem., Miss.) made the first speech in the house against the annexation of the Philippines. He contended that it would be hostile to the spirit of our institutions to assume control over 9,000,000 unwilling subjects, that annexation would cost us \$140,000,000 a year, that the annexation of the islands met none of the tests which applied to our past acquisitions of territory and would be a mistake from a social, political and material standpoint.

Senator Proctor made a statement which explains the paragraph in the urgency deficiency bill appropriating an emergency fund of \$3,000,000 to meet unforeseen contingencies, and which is to be expended at the discretion of the President. The senator said this fund was intended for the payment of a portion of the salaries due the Cuban insurgent army and the Filipinos.

The commerce committee of the nouse decided to take up the Nicaragua canal question on the second Tuesday in January. There will be no hearings, as the committee believes it has all needed information. The matter will be taken up without reference to any special bill, all pending measures being considered. The committee fixed Jan. 6 for passing on the pure food bill. Senator Butler, of North Carolina, gave notice of an amendment he will introduce to the pension appropriation bill providing that the present pension laws shall apply to Confederates as well as Union veterans, with the exception that the Confederates

may not draw back pension. The agricultural appropriation bill passed the house without material amendment. It carried \$3,696,322, or \$187,120 more than the current law. Rep. Corliss (Mich) has introduced bill providing for the construction of a

The bill to extend the customs and

internal revenue laws of the United States over the Hawaiian islands was passed by the house. The house refused to concur in the

senate amendments to the army and navy deficiency bill. Orders have been issued assigning Brig.-Gen. Michael V. Sheridan to the command of the department of the lakes, which includes Forts Wavne

and Brady in Michigan, with headquarters at Chicago.

BRIEF NEWS PARAGRAPHS.

Senor Sagasta, the Spanish premier, is very seriously ill. It is said the deal whereby the Chicago & Alton road goes to the Missouri Pacific has just been concluded.

Six people, including one woman, were killed by a snowslide on the Chilcoot pass.

Canada and Australia will unite in constructing a Pacific cable to connect the two countries.

The customs receipts at Santiago under the occupation of the United States forces up to Dec. 1 were \$275.218. Admiral Sampson says the wealthiest

and most influential people of Cuba want the island annexed to the United States.

The Filipino insurgents demand that Spain pay them \$20,000,000 as a ransom for the 10,000 Spanish prisoners held by them.

Lord Salisbury has recommended to the czar of Russia that the European disarmament conference be held in London next May.

Secretary Alger has ordered the Third, Fourth, 12th, 17th, 20th and 22d U.S. infantry to Manila as soon as

possible to relieve volunteers. The house committee on military affairs by a party vote of 8 to 5 ordered a favorable report on the Hull bill increasing the regular army to 100,000 men.

In view of the growth of German power in Samoa the U.S. consul has has been instructed to act with great vigilance to maintain our influence

there. Elmer E. Rose, an employe of the Dunlop Vehicle Co., at Pontiac, was instantly killed by being crushed in an elevator shaft. He was 25 years old and had been married but six months. Commissioner Campbell reports that the Northwestern Fire Insurance Co., of Chicago, which is not authorized to do business even in Illinois, is flooding this state with eirculars soliciting business.

Diplomatic relations will not be opened with Spain until the treaty of peace is ratified by the senate and the cortes. According to well established tiplomatic usages Spain must take the initiative.

Arrangements have been completed for disinterring the bodies of the 200 soldiers who were buried in the improvised cemetery at Camp Wikoff, L. I., and transporting them to their

former homes. Capt. Midford, a New York inventor, has offered to raise the Spanish cruiser Cristobal Colon at Santiago and the

U. S. battleship Maine at Havana and deliver them at the Brooklyn navy vard. Unless he succeeds he asks no compensation.

#### Saginaw Election Contest.

Washburn Horning and James Green were respectively the Republican and Democratic candidates for treasurer of Saginaw county at the recent election. Horning was declared elected, but Green demanded a recount. In Chesaning township 239 ballots were cast out on the recount because the initials of the inspector had been placed in the tection. corner opposite to that provided by statute. Of these ballots 177 were for Horning and 69 for Green, and as this would elect the latter Horning appealed to the circuit court to compel the canvassers to count the rejected ballots. The court so ordered and Green carried the case to supreme in the flames. court, but he was again knocked out as the decision of the circuit court was affirmed and Horning declared elected.

#### Detroit's Big Exposition in 1901.

The promoters of the scheme for an international exposition at Detroit in 1901, the 200th anniversary of the founding of the city, are pushing ahead with the preliminaries. It was feared for a time that the fact that Buffalo was preparing for a show the same year might interfere and endeavors were made to get the easterners to change their date, but to no avail. The Detroiters feel that their exposition is an institution which will interest the whole northwest, and will carry their plans forward as rapidly as possible. They have good reasons to believe that congress will make a good-sized appropriation to help along.

#### Congressman Smith Declines.

Congressmon William Alden Smith has sent a letter to Gov. Pingree and others declining to be a candidate for the United States senatorship.

Only thirty-five persons signed the pledge, but without discouragement he labored on and in less than six months he had one hundred fifty thousand cOnverts in the city of Cork alone. He went from Ireland to other countries and gained universal espect wherever he taught his work of elevation. 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

England is being driven out of the market of Central Asia by Russia, according to a French magazine. The article referred to is summarized in part as follows: A marked increase is noted in the commerce of British India with Khorassan. In 1896-7 the value of the English exports from Bombay to Mashed was only some \$437,000, less than half that of the preceding year. This condition of affairs is explained as follows. The customs regulations in force along the whole extent of the transcaspian frontier prohibit the entrance of European and British-India goods to the markets of Central Asia, with the exception of tea, muslin, indigo, spices, Indian shoes, precious stones and coral, and these articles are subject to high duties. Russia has succeeded in having these articles exported by way of Batum, thus aiding the Trans-caspian railway. The government of the czar is trying to monopolize the commerce of Eastern and Southern Persia. Subsidies are granted to traders, good roads have been made in the transcaspian territory, consular agents are installed in several districts of Khorassan, and the emigration of Russian merchants to different parts of the province is encouraged. The Russian merchants have penetrated almost to the frontiers of India, so that where the English should be masters of the markets, mostly Russian goods are sold. The Russian government is also paying Russian manufacturers bounties so large that the goods can be placed on the Central Asia market at cost of manufacture, thus driving out goods made in India. The building by Russia of the Trans-caspian railway has given that country an immense advantage.



#### states. Every reader of this paper should exercise the greatest care in protecting his hogs from the disease, as preventative measures are much cheaper and more successful than curative ones. Cures for hog cholera are, to say the least, of doubtful value. The farmer may, however, do much to prevent his hogs from getting cholera. In the first place he may keep his yards and runs clean. This will not prevent hog cholera in all cases but it is believed that filthy surroundings make the coming of the disease more certain. The hogs should be kept away from streams that run through other farms, as it has been found that in the main hogs that drink from streams and rivers have the cholera advent of the germ it proves a fruitful source of contagion.

Wherever possible the herd should be divided into small groups and kept apart. This may cost something both in time and expense, but it is one of the best preventive measures, especially if the groups can be placed on parts of the farm where hogs have not run and that are not near farms that have had cholera. If the disease breaks out, remove the well hogs and not the sick ones. The ground may have been aiready contaminated. In removing well hogs from an infected pen do not put them into pens with other well hogs, as they may cause the disease

to be spread. The drinking water should be carefully watched to see that it is impossible that the germs be car-

ried to the hogs in that way. Many cures have been recommended. the best of which is probably that advocated by the department of agriculture, which however is not advocated in a very positive manner. It is only the best remedy that presents itself in lieu of a specific. It is as follows: 1 part wood charcoal, 1 part sulphur, 2 parts sodium chloride (common salt), 2 parts sodium bicarbonate, 2 parts sodium hypo-sulphite, 1 part sodium sulphate, 1 part antimony sulphate. These ingredients should be well pulverized and then throughly mixed. The dose is one tablespoonful to each 200 weight of hog once a day. It is best fed by mixing with bran, middlings or some other soft food. After having been induced to eat it once, hogs will usually return to it with a relish. It must not be understood that this is a specific, though there are on record many cases where it has ap-







It is possible that the disease treated at the station mentioned differs from some other cases of roup that might be cited. The fact that in one case a well bird was kept for weeks with a pen of sick fowls without taking the disease would seem to indicate that in that case the disease was not strongly contagious. We have known roup in such a form that everything seemed to fall before it. Whether this was due to a different germ or to the greater vigor of the same germ we of course cannot determine. Sooner or later the germ or germs will be isolated and we can then know with greater certainty the results of certain methods of treatment.

A Brooder Dust Bath. Have you ever wondered, asks an exchange, at the unerring instinct manifested by little chicks almost as soon as they come out of the shell? How quickly they scratch and dig and roll in the soft earth, and how they lark in the sunshine and go through the motions of taking a dust bath-if you but offer them the opportunity. And they will do this just as readily if their mother is a silent box, otherwise a brooder, as if they were running with a hen. But what delights a little chick most is to be constantly on the move, constantly feeding or sleeping. With what exceeding delight they venture out into the big world, their sharp little eyes spying out hundreds of minute insects and grubs. De we take a hint and supply these conditions as far as possible? Or do we dump a lot of food before them to gorge on and coop them up in a little 3x4 pen?

Bacteria in Milk .-- It is thought by many that the organisms on the hay that is eaten as food may pass through the body of the animal and be excreted in the milk, but such is not the case. The bacteria that enter the body in the food or drink do not escape from the intestine. If they are not destroyed by the gastric juices, they are excreted in the manure, and can only gain access to the milk by contaminating the same subsequent to milking .- H. L.
