To the Farmers' Review:-A creamery patron, who milks cows when butter fat is high and beef low, but who turns his attention to beef when butter fat is low, and sends in his dairy report for a year and at the close remarks: "Profits scarcely visible to the naked eye. What shall we do to be saved?" Breeding a herd of cows for milk one year and beef the next is a suicidal policy that no enterprising breeder would dare practice. By this haphazard method the above patron realized for butter fat \$19.63 per cow per annum. The Kansas Agricultural College scrub herd pushed along dairy lines brought an average of \$37.75 per cow per annum. Weekly Crop Bulletin.

The weekly crop report issued from the United States weather office tells a distressing tale of drought throughout the state. The report says: The first three days of the week were cool with light frosts in some of the upper peninsula and the northern counties of the lower peninsula; the last four days were very warm. Moderately heavy showers occurred in portions of the upper peninsula, but not a drop of rain is reported from any station in the lower peninsula; generally the weather has been hot and dry, and this condition was intensified by the nearly cloudless skies that have prevailed most of the week. The effect on corn, late potatoes, beans and pastures in the southern half of the state has been vory detrimental; in the principal agricultural counties of the lower peninsula corn and beans are drying up and ripening prematurely. Pastures are very brown and late potatoes are nearly at a standstill. Many farmers have been cutting their corn in order to save it for fodder, and beans have ripened prematurely and their harvest already begun in some counties. Fall plowing is fairly well advanced in the central and southern counties, but the parched soil has brought much of this work to a standstill and farmers are waiting for rain before resuming preparations for the seeding of fall wheat and rye. Rain is therefore very much meeded in nearly every county of the lower peninsula. In the upper peninsula the conditions have been generally favorable and crops have made good progress.

Daring Hold Up.

The boys were sons of respectable families, having left home unbeknown to their parents for the purpose of doing a little hoboing just for the fun of it. Popezinski told the robbers he had no coin, but after investigating they found 30 cents on his person, and for telling a lie the tramps threw him off the top of a box car

Here are Several of Interest to Property Owners. As time for paying state and county recent meeting. taxes will soon be at hand. the taxpayers of the state will be interested in several important amendments made to the general tax law by the last legislature. Section 59, which formerly provided for interest on delinquent

TAX LAW AMENDMENTS

taxes at the rate of 8 per cent per annum and the addition of a 4 per cent collection fee, was amended so as to make the penalty 1 per cent a month. the additional collection fee being retained. Under the previous law there was no charge for the cost of advertising, etc., until the lands had been advertised

and made subject to sale. The advertisement was made in April and there was no charge on the account mentioned until the land was actually offered for sale. An amendment increases this expense from 70 cents to \$1 per description, and makes the charge a lien upon the land on Oct. 1 next preceding the time prescribed for the sale of the land.

Lands now held for unpaid taxes of 897 will be sold for taxes, unless the latter are sooner paid, in May next. Under the old law the expense of this sale, which has been increased to \$1, would not become a lien until that date, but the new law makes a lien on Oct. 1 next.

Another amendment is the restoration of the fee payable to county treasurers for tax certificates to accompany warranty deeds. This was reduced from 25 to 15 cents and subsequently abolished, but the last legislature restored it at the latter figure.

Prisoner Leaped to Death.

Unfortunate Mary Ann Carr, 25 years of age, dived to death from the lower leck of the steamer Darius Cole into the waters of Lake St. Clair on the 27th, while on her way from her home in Port Huron, to Detroit, in charge of Detective Judson C. Lombard. The steamer was stopped and small boats lowered, but all efforts at recovery were futile, for the body soon sank out of sight. Some of the passengers say they saw it come to the surface but once and then it disappeared. The young lady was being returned to Detroit to answer to the charge of grand

larceny. The cause of the drowning was not due to Mary's fear of being convicted or of serving a possible five years, but simply because she did not like the idea of the detective bossing her around.

arations for War - The Cleveland Street Car Strike to be Investigated by State Authority.

New Collseum at Chicago Collapsed. Twelve steel arches, each weighing 33 tons, which were to have supported the superstructure of the Coliseum building in course of erection on Wabash avenue, Chicago, fell to the ground'late on the afternoon of Aug. 28th. It is known that nine lives were crushed out. The bodies of two men are supposed to be under the wreckage. Ten are in the hospital with in-

juries received in the accident and of these four will surely die, one may possibly recover and the rest are for the greater part seriously injured. The immense "Traveller," or derrick, which had been use in the erection of the arches, had been removed and the agents of the bridge company were accounting their work as practically completed, when suddenly and without the slightest warning the arch last

put in place suddenly fell over against the one next to it. The weight was too much for this, it gave way, crashed against the third, and then, one by one, the great steel spans fell over to the south, precisely in the same manner as a number of cards would fall.

Making Preparations For War.

The Cape Town correspondent of the London Daily Mail says: Despite the virtual blockade of war material in Delagoa bay, the Cape government is sending enormous consignments of munitions of war to Bloemfontein. During the present month over 2,000,-000 cartridges have been sent and 500 rifles were despatched recently from | taining. Port Elizabeth to Bloemfontein. In addition to this the Cape ministry, while absolutely declining to arm the volunteers of the colony, continues to afford other facilities to the Orange Free State to arm its burghers just across the water, freely granting the use of the colonial railways for the distribution of cartridges from the Bloemfontein arsenal to the border towns. The patience of the people is becoming exhausted, and unless the imperial government acts quickly and decisively the gravest damage may ensue to British prestige. England is also making daily preparations.

Oleveland Strike to be Investigated.

It is probable that the state board of arbitration will investigate the Cleveland street railway strike on the demand of the executive committee of the strikers. Thus far the board has not tried to settle this strike because it had not the power to do so unless both parties were agreed. The law ovides, however, that in case there is no arbitration either party may ask for an investigation which will be judicial in its nature, and ascertain who is responsible for the strike and its prolongation. The strikers were asked by the central labor union to demand such an investigation. Secretary Bishop, of the state board, is now in the city and he says he is ready to take up the investigation if it shall be demanded.

raised from Manila bay and now being rebuilt under his supervision at Hong Kong. These ships are the Isla de Cuba, Isla de Luzon and Don Austrias. He sets forth in detail the condition of work. He says that they were more damaged by fire than by shot, and that most of the rebuilding has been made necessary by the burned woodwork. They were 80 per cent completed on July 1, and Mr. Hobson says they will be ready to turn over to the navy for service within six weeks after the arrival of the batteries and the electrical plants. Where the Money Went.

The annual report of the auditor for the interior department has been submitted to the secretary of the treasury. The report shows that the total number of accounts and claims settled during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1899, was 25,233, involving the expenditure of \$173,598,233, being an increase over the last fiscal year of 2,659 claims, involving \$24,278,866. The great bulk of this money went, of course, to the government pensioners, \$139,775,141 being expended on this account. Railroad Accident in Chile.

A great railway accident occurred at Santiago de Chile on the 24th. An entire train fell into the river Mapocha, which runs through that city, and many lives were lost. Although the tremendous storms that have been raging for a fortnight throughout Chile continue, there has been some abatement. Advices from various points indicate widespread distress and misery. 

Watering the Cow.

No dairyman who makes a study of his business is satisfied with watering. his herd once a day. If his cattle can. be induced to drink two or three times a day he is glad of it. All the cattle may not be equally thirsty at the same time. Cows require an immenseamount of water, as every farmer boy has noticed. Experiments have shown. that the average milch cow needs about eighty-one pounds of water a day while in milk-this is nearly ten gallons-and over fifty pounds while dry. Of this the cow in milk takes rather contents, including numerous pieces of | more than two-thirds as drink and the rest in her food, while the dry cow takes rather less than two-thirds as drink and little more than one-third. in her food.

Eggs from Prize Winners .- Before you pay high prices for eggs for hatching to a man whose birds took "first" or any other prize at the poultry show. make sure first that the birds he exhibited were his own, and not borrowed for the occasion, and, second, that the eggs you get are from the same stock as he used for breeders last year. There is so much borrowing of hens and cocks to make a show, and carrying them home without their ever mating with or seeing his breeding stock, that a man stands about as good a chance to go to some neighbor who has the breed wanted, and get eggs from his breeding pens, as he would to pay a high price for eggs to one who took the prizes, but whose laying stock. may be below the average .-- Maine Farmer.
