

Port Mahon.

Port Mahon, in Minorca, has had a varied experience of conquerors. It was first captured in 1708 by Gens. Stuart captured it from them-this time without losing a man-in 1798, but in 1802 the peace of Amiens gave it back finally to Spain. Doings of the Week Recorded in a Brief Style.

The Beet Sugar Factories at Bay City Will Distribute \$500,000 Among the Farmers This Winter-The President was Heartily Received in Michigan.

Beet Sugar Harvest. This is the harvest time for the sugar beet growers and they are making the most of it. The factory of the Michigan Sugar Co., of Bay City, is in the midst of its second campaign, and consuming about 500 tons of beets daily. The factory of the Bay City Sugar Co. is about ready to start, the machinery having been tested during the week and found to be in fine condition. The West Bay City Sugar Co.'s factory is nearing completion and the officers say will be in running order by Nov. 1. The two latter factories will also consume each 500 tons of beets per day. Farmers are busy hauling beets to the Michigan and Bay City compamies factories, which are located side by side, and the scene in the vicinity is daily very animated. Several hundred loads of beets are received every day. Payments are made by check the 15th of each month, covering the Iron, Kalkaska, Lake, Mackinac, Meprevious month's haul. Upward of costa, Menominee, Midland, Missaukee. \$500,000 will be distributed among the Montmorency, Muskegon, Newaygo, farmers this winter for beets.

A special dispatch from Cape Town, dated Oct. 17th, says a big battle has been fought at Mafeking and that the Boers were repulsed, losing 300 men against 18 Britishers killed.

According to the program of embarkations from Great Britain within the next few days, there will be shipped a total of 18,000 troops of all ranks and 1,600 horses

Word has been received of a big slaughter of Boers near Mafeking, when 1,500 were led into a death trap and the mines exploded at the hands of the British.

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



The Fall Web-Worm.

The Latin name of this worth is: Hyphantria cunea. The Colorado Ex-periment Station gives the following: description of this insect: This is a yellowish or brownish caterpillar with a black head, that forms a large loose web or tent in a great variety of trees, beginning to appear about the first of: July and continuing through the summer. The larvae are rather sparsely covered with long hairs that are whitish or yellowish in color, with occa-sional black ones for variety. This insect is readily distinguished from the Tent caterpillar in habits, as the larvae of the Fall web-worm form a very loose tent with which they inclose the leaves upon which they feed, and they do not appear until the Tent caterpillars have nearly or quite disappeared. In the illustration "a" and "b" are fullgrown larvae showing light and dark forms: "c" is the chrysalis; "d" is the moth, showing dark spots. All are some enlarged. The lines show the actual length. 


From Farmers' Review: It is a common complaint of people who grow squashes for winter consumption that the fruits will not keep for any length of time after removal from the field to the vegetable cellar. Sometimes this trouble may be in the choice of varieties, but this seems to be seldom the case, since even the old reliable Hubbard is complained of as much as the rest. 
