



Miles Revises His Statement.

Lieut.-Gen. Miles vigorously denounced Secretary Root's army reorganization bill before the senate committee on military affairs Thursday, and, ta consequence, speculation is rife as to whether President Roosevelt will take advantage of the incident to retire the general, the latter already having reached the age limit.

Gen. Miles denies that he threatened to resign in the event of the bill becoming a law and he gave out a revised statement of the language used by him as follows:





From the Greeks and the Romans the early Christians borrowed their emblems of resurrection and immortality-the Peacock and the Phoenix. The Easter egg, too, as a religious symbol is as old as the pyramids of Egypt and the primer of Oriental philosophy, which taught that the world was hatched from an egg about the time of the vernal equinox. We read also that the Romans in early spring ran races in an oval-an eggshaped arena, when the winner was presented with eggs accompanied with wishes that his noble family may increase and multiply. Christianity colored the egg red to remind the people

That ceremonial Christianity is in a large measure paganism transformed or rejuvenated is admitted by the best scholars in the church as well as out of it-by Cardinal Nicholas Wiseman and Baronius, as well as by Max-Muller and Renan. "The church has borrowed many customs from the religion of the Romans and other pagans," says an ecclesiastical authority, "but it has meliorated them." Another writes that "the pagan festivals laden with superstition were changed into the praiseworthy festivals of the martyrs." Still another defends the practice by saying: "It was permitted the church to transfer to pious uses those. ceremonies which the pagans had wickedly applied in a superstitious worship."
